ECUADOR 16 June - 16 August 1997 - birding on public transportation -

Introduction

ECUADOR has become one of the most popular birding countries in South America the last few years. Guided tours with highly skilled tourleaders are a comfortable but expensive way of experiencing one of the worlds largest avifaunas. There is a much more inexpensive and often more exciting way to bird Ecuador. If you're well prepared and a bit adventurous you can visit most of the best birding sites on public transportation. You will probably not find as many species as on a tour (in the same amount of time), but you do find the birds on your own. This is what my friend Daniel Bengtsson and I did in the summer of 1997. Buses go almost anywhere, and if they don't go all the way, there are the possibilities of either taking a taxi, to hitch-hike or simply walk. Our very useful guidebook was "A guide to birdwatching in Ecuador and the Galápagos Islands" by Best et al. Except for the sometimes misguiding maps, this guide is very good and by far the best available. When it comes to the Amazon, low cost birding of high quality is hardly non-existing. Therefore we spent 5 days (3¹/₂ days of birding) at La Selva Lodge, where we were guided by the splendid guide José Hualinga. These days were more expensive than the other 7¹/₂ weeks of our journey! During our two months we managed to find no less than 871 species, including many rare and spectacular birds. The facts that we spent 10 full days non-birding and that buses can't be stopped when ever you want them to, makes this number quite impressive.

The birdwatching guide has some valuable information on many localities about public transportation. Complement this with information from either the Lonely Planet Guide or South American Handbook. Both books provides useful information on transportation, accomodation and lots of other stuff. Remember though, timetables are subjects to change and many transports and places to stay the night exist which are not mentioned in these books. As a matter of fact it seems that you can get to almost any tiny little village in Ecuador connected with a road (but make sure to ask about departures so you don't get stuck!). Bus stations in Ecuador, terminal terrestres, are very good. All long-distance buses usually depart from the same terminal (while local buses often depart from a separate terminal) which makes travelling very easy. If not full, you can stop a bus anywhere on the road, and the bus drops you off where ever you like it to. A general advice is to try to avoid Friday and Sunday afternoons if you intend to get on a bus on one of the main roads, since many people travel in the weekends and buses may pass by full. You should be very unlucky to get stuck more than a few hours, though. Hitch-hiking is relatively easy. Some expect a fare but most don't. You'll notice. Trucks won't stop, they're not allowed to take passengers. Avoid hitch-hiking in the cities. Taxis are well worth the price to get to certain places like Bombuscaro (\$5) and Cajanuma (\$7,50). If you want to be picked up to get back you should make a deal with the taxidriver. We never did that (when the food and water is gone it's OK to walk, especially downhill),

but I have exclusively positive experiences from Costa Rica in that matter. Now about accommodation. Though we dragged the tent along several times, we only used it at Cerro Mongus. It clearly depends on how hardy birders you are if a tent will be useful. For a site like Cerro Mongus it is necessary. Otherwise accomodation can be found at or fairly close to many birding locations. A common price for a room with two beds (or double bed) at a simple hotel is \$5, the cheapest we stayed was only \$2,50, in Sozoranga. The rooms are often small and highly spartanic, often with more or less uncomfortable beds, but they serve their purpose. Many of these hotels are nice and safe (probably safer than "tourist" hotels), however, and extra options like a fan or private bathroom are often possible at a reasonable cost.

If you have the time, if you want to save a lot of money and get more of the adventure - take the bus! The hordes of fabulous ecuadorian birds are within reach also for the low budget traveller!

Short description of visited sites

This is only a short oversight of the sites we visited. You will need a guidebook, preferably "A guide to Birdwatching in Ecuador and the Galápagos Islands" which is mentioned in the introduction. Here you may find some valuable details, though, not covered in the book.

Western Lowlands

Río Palenque Remnant lowland rainforest (167 ha) surrounded by plantations. Easily reached by bus. Accomodation available for \$15/night. Many rare species have been recorded, but we found the birding very frustrating. This is however one of the most easily reached lowland rainforest remnants in the west.

Chone Lakes Ponds 1 km. east of town and lake with associated marshes 10 km. SW of town by the road towards Manta and Portoviejo. Tons of waterbirds! The town as well as both sites are right by a busy transport road to the coast. Several cheap hotels in town.

Isla de la Plata Daily departures from Puerto Lopez with several tour agencies, most take \$40 (including the \$10 national park fee). Don't miss this experience! There are two trails on the island.

You will only have the chance to walk one trail in a single day (choosed by the guides). To see the Waved Albatross (normally 2 pairs, March-September) you have to walk the Punta Machete trail. On the Punta Escalera trail there is a small colony of Red-footed Booby, a species hard to get if you don't walk that trail (we missed it). There are several hotels in Puerto Lopez.

Ayampe Deciduous and humid dry forest, very good for Tumbesian endemics. Ayampe is about 20 kilometers south of Puerto Lopez. If you take the 06.00 bus you will get to the river by 06.30, shortly before sunrise. Follow the road by the river. The area is remarkably undisturbed, but few trails enter the forest. Try some dry riverbeds (but watch out for snakes!). Birding is good also south of town, though it's even harder to get into any forest.

Monteverde Saltlakes is right by the road between Puerto Lopez and La Libertad/Salinas. Lots of shorebirds and terns are present at any time. The beach at the nearby village San Pablo is good for gulls and terns.

Lagunas Ecuasal and Punta Carnero These saltpans hold large concentrations of birds, and you have a good chance of finding rare birds for Ecuador. Surrounding desert scrub is good for several scrub species. Take a taxi from either La Libertad or Salinas.

Northwestern foothills (Upper Tropical Zone)

Lita is a small village at 570 m. in the northwest, easily reached by bus or train from Ibarra. Birding in the surrounding forest patches by the railroad can be rewarding. There is one simple hotel in the village.

El Placer, 23 km. west of Lita, is a superb birdwatching site at 650 m. accessible only by railroad. The area holds many Chocó endemics and rare species. This is a tiny village with only seven houses, so you have to bring along a tent. We were lucky to stay with a man called Mario. This is the last wilderness in western lowland Ecuador, with forest stretching out over the lowlands as far as the eye can see. El Placer is a site for the more adventurous. Birding is probably excellent by the newly finished Ibarra-San Lorenzo road as well.

Western Subtropical Zone

Mindo A classical birding site (1250-1750 m.) close to Quito, holding many Chocó endemics as well as large mixed species flocks of tanagers and lots of hummingbirds. The deep red west andean race of Cock-of-the-Rock is absolutely stunning and rather easily found on the Yellow House Trail! Mindo can be reached by bus, though you might have to walk 8 kilometers from the main road. The walk is downhill, and there are lots of birds one the way. There are several hotels in the town.

Bella Vista (1750-2350 m.) is a small eco-lodge opened in 1995. It has become very popular, not least for the hummingbird feeders and rare species like Tanager Finch and Giant Antpitta. The forest property isn't very large and a major portion is secondary, but the birding is still great and differs markedly from that in Mindo.

Temperate Zone

Cerro Mongus (3200-3750 m.) is a very good site holding cloud forest, elfin forest and páramo, though a bit hard to reach. You must bring a tent and all supplies, but you who manage will probably be rewarded with some fabulous and rare birds. Chestnut-bellied Cotinga (described in 1994) is the main attraction but it seems to be seen rather infrequently. Both Daniel and I think that Cerro Mongus was one of the most exciting sites visited. Good trails not depicted on the map in the guidebook lead south from the only clearing in the forest and from the southern edge of the páramo.

Papallacta Pass (2500-4250 m.) is passed when going eastwards from Quito towards the Amazon, a must for birdwatchers. Many buses pass daily, but avoid Fridays and Sundays. The weather is often quite awful by the pass itself (bring warm and wind-proof clothes), but when it's not this is the place to see the Andean Condor. Beyond the pass there is a lake which often have some waterbirds, and birding the temperate forest can be rewarding.

Cotopaxi NP (plateau at 3800, road ends at 4600 m.). A classical area for Rufous-breasted Seedsnipe and Ecuadorian Hillstar, both which can be seen at Papallacta as well. Magnificent views of Cotopaxi itself in suitable weather. We didn't have much of a chance to do any birding. Without a car you have to hitch-hike to get here. Especially at weekends this shouldn't be very difficult, but I don't recommend it.

Lasso (3000 m.) is a village some 10 kilometers south of the Cotopaxi NP turn-off. Here you can see some agricultural species as well as Suptropical Doradito in a nearby marsh (we did not). This is a site you might stop at if you're passing through, otherwise this is not a site of priority.

Cajanuma (P.N. Podocarpus, 2550-3400 m.) is a locality not to be missed if going to southern Ecuador. Birding is simply great! If the weather conditions allows, don't hesitate to take the strenuous (but rather short) walk up to the páramo, where you will be rewarded with fantastic views and hopefully Neblina Metaltail (described in 1980). Take a taxi from Loja. It will drive you all the way to the refugio on request. There are a few simple guestrooms at the refugio, but it might be good to bring a tent just in case.

The Southwest

Buenaventura (900 m.) is a frequently visited site in the southwest, famed for the El Oro Parakeet described in 1985. The forest is severely fragmanted, but still there are many birds around. There are several hotels in nearby Piñas, and the first morning bus to Machala will drop you off at the Virgen at dawn. The map in the guidebook is very confusing.

Sozoranga (1300-2650 m.) is a little visited site (as the two following sites) in a largely deforested but beautiful area. Birding is quite good, though the good forest left is almost impenetrable. Expect to see lots of Tumbesian Endemics. The only hotel in town is very cheap and has nesting Chestnut-collared Swallows. As for Buenaventura, the map isn't good.

Tambo Negro (600-1000 m.) holds even more Tumbesian Endemics than Sozoranga. We did hardly no birding here (read about this adventure in the diary!), but we were told not to wade across the river without rubber boots. You might get some kind of infection, though I didn't understand exactly what it was all about. If staying in Macará, you can reach Tambo Negro at or even before dawn. I strongly recommend not to walk from Sozoranga, as we did (see dairy)!!

Utuana (2500 m.) is a small forest site easily reached from Sozoranga. The most interesting bird found here is the rare Gray-headed Antbird, and several new species for Ecuador have been found here, 10 kilometers from the Peruvian boarder. We only stayed a few hours here, without seeing any rarities, but the area is well worth investigating.

Eastern Subtropical Zone

San Isidro (1700-200 m.), just above Cosanga between Baeza-Tena is a rather new and popular site with good trails and expensive lodge accomodation. Day visitors have to pay \$10. If staying in Baeza the first bus will drop you off at Cosanga at 06.30, and then it is 3 km to walk to the lodge. You miss an important morning hour, but birds seems to be very active also in the afternoon. San Isidro is a must for east slope birding, though many species are the same as at Guacamayos.

Guacamayos (1700-2300 m.) is a completely forested ridge only 8 km south of San Isidro. Birding is very good, but there is only one trail which goes almost on top of the ridge. We found it hard birded despite the fact that we had the privilage to enjoy a totally clear morning, which is rare. The same bus that pass Cosanga at 06.30 reach the Virgen of Guacamayos 15 minutes later, and many buses pass daily.

San Rafael Falls (1300-1400 m.) is right by the road to Lago Agrio in the Amazon (5 hours from Quito). The waterfall itself is magnificent, and the surrounding forest host large mixed-species flocks and many goodies. Accomodation is available for \$2.50 (simple) or \$6. A very nice site.

Eastern Upper Tropical Zone

Loreto Road (500-1200 m.), south of Guacamayos, offers superb birding in the entire upper tropical zone. A car is highly favourable, but there are also regular buses. We stayed in Tena. The first bus reached km. 16, where we got off, at sunrise. One of the best areas is around km 3. The road is well worth much more time than we gave it.

Bombuscaro (P.N. Podocarpus, 950-1200 m.) is a very nice site in southern Ecuador. The superb endemic White-breasted Parakeet is frequently seen in this area, and there are many other good birds all over the place. There are limited space for a few visitors to stay (free) at the refugio, otherwise you can stay in nearby Zamora 8 km away and take a taxi to Bombuscaro. The NP fee is \$10 at Bombuscaro but only \$5 at Cajanuma. The ticket is valid at both entrances, so to save 5 box just go to Cajanuma first. The Loja-Zamora Road have lots of good birds. We didn't do any birding there, but I will do that next time I get there in July 1999.

The Amazon

Tena (530 m.) is a town just below the andean foothills. Secondary forest just outside town hold many of the more common amazonian species as well as foothill species, some of which prefer degraded habitat. Austral migrants seems to like the area. The area is well worth birding.

Reserva Jatun Sacha (400-500 m.) is supposed to hold 530 species, which seems impossible due to the secondary condition of the forest in general. We didn't spend much time there, only a few hours. Birds and even bird sounds were few. The staff came first at 07.00. The best area in the

reserve should be investigated, though. There are a canopy tower there also. The entrance fee, which we never paid, is \$25.

La Selva Lodge (250 m.) is one of the most famous lodges in the Amazon. The multitude of habitats around the lodge hold a bird list of probably 550 species. Cocha Antshrike and Zigzag Heron is perhaps the two most sought-after birds here, of which we saw both. During our 3½ days at La Selva we recorded about 250 species, which is quite OK. Our guide José Hualinga was superb, and excellent guiding was the reason why we chosed an expensive lodge as La Selva. There are many cheaper alternatives, but guides and habitats may be less good. A 5 day/4 night programme at La Selva is \$800 (1997), including air fare from Quito, while the cheaper alternative might cost \$350-450 and perhaps only will give half as many species of birds. A good trip to the Amazon is expensive, that's just how it is. I've read about another lodge on the Internet, which is supposed to be the even better than La Selva, situated in an area with large tracts of untouched forest in the surroundings. Check it up! Kapawi is another very good lodge, though the most expensive and lacking a canopy tower.

Short diary

6/16 We left Stockholm early in the morning. The first plane took us to Paris, from where we were supposed to fly to Bogotá and Quito. However, our plane from Stockholm was delayed. We arrived at the gate 5 minutes before departure - too late for boarding. About 10 hours later we landed at **Miami International Airport** in **Florida**! Birds were disappointingly few, but we managed to find both Common and Boat-tailed Grackles. Bonus birds! The time was about 23.30 when we rang the bell at **Casa Sueca** (the former swedish school in Quito), 5 hours late. Finally in **Ecuador**!

6/17 Our first day we did some bank visits, shopping and look around in the surroundings. Casa Sueca was our superb base throughout the summer. Lying just a 15 minute walk from the airport and having all necessary comforts like a stove, cooler, hot shower, washing mashine and a swedish library, we couldn't have a better place to rest after our birding trips! Since we travelled around by bus all the time, it was very good to be able to leave everything you didn't need there.

6/18 We had planned to take the 06.30 bus towards Mindo (Puerto Quito), but it was canceled. Next bus left at 09.00. We reached the **Mindo** crossroad at 11-11.30. Having passed all superb forests next to the road (frustrating!), it was very exciting to start the walk down to Mindo. The weather was cloudy, but we only had some drops of rain. The highlight was undoubtedly a pair of stunning Velvet-purple Coronets, one of the no. 1 dream hummers! A male Golden-headed Quetzal was another great bird, and among many Tanagers were Metallic-green, Rufous-throated and Swallow-Tanagers. In Mindo we checked in at the cheap hostal Guadual.

6/19 We started the day with the Yellow House Trail. The bird activity was somewhat slow, but we found 2 male Andean Cock-of-the-Rocks, 1 male Green-crowned Woodnymph, a pair of Pale-eyed Thrushes, 4 Slaty Antwrens, 3 Silver-throated Tanagers and 2 Black-billed Peppershrikes. In the afternoon we walked by the Mindo River. We found a Yellow-tufted Dacnis before heavy rain ended the birding. Great dinner in the evening!

6/20 Today we started by the river and walked on the ridge south of Mindo. We had several great mixed species flocks containing 2-3 Glistening-green and 2 White-winged Tanagers as well as

6 Toucan Barbets. Hummers included 3 Purple-bibbed Whitetips, 7 Booted Racket-tails, 2 male Purple-throated Woodstars and 1 Brown Inca. Club-winged Manakins at lek and 3 Golden-headed Quetzals were other goodies. Heavy rain spoiled the late afternoon, but we were quite satisfied with the day!

6/21 This our last day in Mindo we did another try at the Yellow House trail - a smart move! Good birds included 1 Rufous-bellied Nighthawk, 4-5 male Cock-of-the-Rocks (marvelous views!), 1 Ochre-breasted Antpitta, several Esmeraldas Antbirds, 1 Tawny-throated Leaftosser, 1 Barred Hawk, 2 male Violet-tailed Sylphs and 1 male Fawn-breasted Brilliant. In the afternoon we climbed halfway to the main road to see a male Velvet-purple Coronet, a male Masked Trogon and a pair of Powerful Woodpeckers at nest hole. We stayed the night in Mindo to catch the 06.30 bus the next morning.

6/22 During the night I got a bad stomach, which wasn't too funny. We decided to try to get to **Bella Vista** anyway, to see the Plate-billed Mountain-Toucan. It was no good idea walking to Bella Vista by foot. We got a lift to Tandayapa, but since I felt rather weak we didn't make it all the way. Some nice birds were seen though, i.e. White-tipped Swift,Green-and-black Fruiteater and Yellow-faced Grassquit. On our way back to **Quito** we had splendid views of Cayambe, Antisana (a rather uncommon occurrence) and Cotopaxi. I spent the rest of the day in bed with fever.

6/23 Well needed rest in Quito.

6/24 A day to remember. Packed with food for three days, a tent and sleeping bags, we headed north with a bus towards Tulcán. We got off the bus at **El Juncal** in the dry Chota Valley. To get to **Cerro Mongus** wouldn't be an easy task. Hardly no one had heard about the village of Impuerán... At the Río Chota bridge we had a pair of Scrub Tanagers on our way to the nearby village Piquriche. After several discussions with locals we were told to take a bus towards Monte Olivo. From the village Caldera de San Francisco (5 kms. from Piquriche) the road climbs about 1500 meters to Impuer n. We were lucky to get a ride with a truck after just half an our of waiting. After that we only had to walk 4 kms. (strenuous, but a Black-and-chestnut Eagle gave us strength!) to get to the forest and a good camping site. The tent was up at 17.00, just minutes before a shower! A short birding walk gave us a beautiful Buff-winged Starfrontlet, 2 Golden-crowned Tanagers and several Slaty Brush-Finches before going to bed. What a day! We fell asleep to the calls of three White-throated Screech-Owls.

6/25 A great day, though starting with rain. Star birds were everywhere, but nothing bet the feeling of observing a pair of Chestnut-bellied Cotinga in the fascinating elfin forest. The Cotinga was only described in 1994, and very few have seen it! Yes! YES! 1 Masked Mountain-Tanager, 1 Andean Guan, 2 male Rainbow-bearded Thornbills, 1 male Viridian Metaltail, 2 female Great Sapphirewings, several Golden-breasted Pufflegs, 1 White-browed Spinetail, 3 White-chinned Thistletails, 2 Black-headed Hemispinguses and 10 Andean Siskins were a few of the other highlights. We also saw a displaying Red-crested Cotinga! But still we had more to come...

6/26 If yesterday was superb, this day was just unbelieveable! The ultimate observation was that of a male Chestnut-bellied Cotinga, a Masked Mountain-Tanager and a Black-backed Bush-Tanager sitting next to eachother in the same treetop!! The best new species were Black-thighed Puffleg, Purple-backed Thornbill, Black-chested Mountain-Tanager and a Tawny-breasted Tinamou that almost hit us when stumbling down from nowhere!

6/27 Our last morning at Cerro Mongus was almost cloudless and thus gave us tremendous views of Cayambe to the south. Sword-billed Hummingbirds were seen very briefly, and as bad as these observations were, as little food and water we had left - hardly nothing! We also saw c. 10 Slaty Finches, 2 Barred Fruiteaters and 1 Streak-throated Bush-Tyrant. Back in Impuer n we joined a local transport to El Juncal. After a while the truck was completely filled with crops and people! Starved and thirsty we celebrated our success at a small restaurant. After some trouble finding a bus to stop (and being accused of being racists by some black women, probably because of our poor spanish and that we wouldn't buy pepinos), we finally made our way back to **Ibarra** and **Quito**.

6/28 Rest in **Quito**. In the evening we had an appointment with a swedish tourist group that we were to follow to Tena the next day.

6/29 Mostly a bus-day. We gave some lectures about the nature in Ecuador for our free ride. At noon we visited the radio station Interoceanica in Santa Rosa (half an hour east of Baeza - I did some birding there last time in Ecuador) managed by the Iglesia del Pacto, a sister church to the covenant church of Sweden and USA. We reached **Tena** in the evening. As the others continued to Misahualli, we checked in at the simple hotel Jumani.

6/30 At dawn we started birding the Auca Trail by the Tena River. Shortly thereafter it started to rain... However the rain stopped after some time, and we were able to find several nice birds. Most interesting were 1 female Napo Sabrewing, 5 Orange-fronted Plushcrowns, 2-3 Large Elaenias, 6 Golden-winged Tody-Flycatchers and a female Lemon-throated Barbet. In the afternoon we tried some birding at the nearby Puerto Napo, but strong heat and lack of suitable habitats made the walk rather boring. Better luck tomorrow!

7/1 We started with a real bommer! The **Reserva Jatun Sacha**, easily reached by bus, is supposed to hold 530 species. It was a very quiet morning, the staff was very late, and there were hardly no birds at all! We gave up after a few hours (we didn't visit the best area, though), and found our way to the upper parts of the **Loreto Road** (Km. 3-5). The birding was a lot better. A pair of Black-and-white Tody-Tyrants (I only saw the female), a female Andean Cock-of-the-Rock, a pair of Bronze-green Euphonias and 1-2 Ecuadorian Tyrannulets were the best birds seen before heavy rain forced us back to Tena, first in an open truck and later a bus.

7/2 Loreto Road again. We jumped off the bus at c. km. 16 shortly before sunrise and started to walk our way back to Hollín. Steep slopes made the first 2 hours hard birded, but soon we had a pretty good list: Crested Quetzal (heard), Golden-collared Honeycreeper, Golden-eyed Flowerpiercer and lots of Tanagers including our first Paradise and Green-and-gold Tanagers were great, and Daniel saw a Coppery-chested Jacamar. Later on we caught a bus to the upper part of the road where the day was completed with some fabulous birds: 47 (fortyseven!) Military Macaws flew eastward at a distance, and a pair of Solitary Eagles soared over the forest. A flowering tree at the same spot provided us with extreme observations of a superb male Wire-crested Thorntail (dream hummer!), together with a male Booted Racket-tail and a less-spectacular female Violet-headed Hummingbird. In the roadside scrub there was a pair of Dusky Spinetail. At about 17.00 we took a bus to **Baeza**, which was our base for the next three nights.

7/3 We left Baeza by bus at 06.00 and got off at the top of the **Guacamayos** ridge 45 minutes later. It might sound impossible, but this almost always foggy, rainy and damp place was bathing in sunshine with great views in all directions! Birding was however frustrating. Many birds were heard but few seen. Luckily we could identify the Boreal/Tengmalm's Owl-like song of the very rare Moustached Antpitta (or sp. nov.!), and an adult Solitary Eagle flew by at a distance of only

25 meters! In the afternoon we birded at **San Isidro** for a few hours. We heard a Highland Tinamou and 3 Emerald Toucanets, 1 Chestnut-breasted Coronet and 1 Grass-green Tanager were other highlights. The area needed much further investigation!

7/4 Back at San Isidro. The morning was slow, but it got better in the afternoon. Among the best birds were a female of the rare Lazuline Sabrewing, a pair of Black-and-chestnut Eagles and a male Chestnut-breasted Chlorophonia. Skulkers seen were one bird each of Chestnut-crowned Antpitta, Ash-colored Tapaculo and Equatorial Rufous-vented Tapaculo. Back to Baeza in the evening.

7/5 Desperate to see a Black-billed Mountain-Toucan we headed to **Guacamayos** again. Weather today was back to normal - foggy, but at least not rainy. The Mountain-Toucan didn't cooperate, but 1 Green-fronted Lancebill and 2 male Collared Incas gave us a splendid show. Notable were also 1 Yellow-bellied Chat-Tyrant and an extremely dense flock of Chestnut-collared Swifts. A mudslide had been stopping the traffic from Tena for hours, but fortunately the traffic came through just when we wanted it to. It was great to come "home" to our comfortable **Casa Sueca** after a week of hard birding and much rain.

7/6 Today we were going to try to convince the swedish tourist group to pay a visit to **Cotopaxi NP**. We started with a visit to the evangelical church Santisima Trinidad in southern Quito, a great experience! After that, we managed to convince them that Cotopaxi was worth a try. The visit became disappointingly short, because of windy and cool weather combined with lightly dressed swedes. Andean Lapwings were the best birds. The others were going to Baños, but we jumped off at the nearby village **Lasso** to look for Subtropical Doradito. We had to be satisfied with Chiguanco Thrushes and 1 Ash-breasted Sierra-Finch. Back to Quito in the afternoon.

7/7 Rest and food shopping for our next trip. In the evening we took a bus to **Ibarra** where we spent the night.

7/8 A travel agency in Quito told us that the train between Ibarra and San Lorenzo was daily. This was not the case. We waited in vain for the train to come, and were finally told that it didn't go until the next day. For a moment the day seemed to be a miserable failure, but suddenly I got a brilliant idea. Why not try to find a bus to Lita? Two hours later we left Ibarra with a San Lorenzo bus (yes, the road was finished and we had no idea of that!). At 12.00 we reached **Lita** and got a room at the only hotel in the village, Los Naranjos (newly painted in a mint green color). At 12.30 we started birding by the railroad track. Bird activity was rather slow at the beginning, but during the afternoon we found several good birds: 42 (!) Swallow-tailed Kites in one flock, Maroon-tailed Parakeets, Stripe-billed Aracaris, a male Purple-chested Hummingbird, a female Green Thorntail, a pair of Scarlet-browed Tanagers and a beautiful male Scarlet-thighed Dacnis. Not bad at all!

7/9 The train was supposed to arrive at 10.30 so we had several hours for birding in the morning. We birded the hill of the opposite side of the river. Hummingbirds were plentiful, with several good species seen like Bronzy Hermit, Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer and our first Purple-crowned Fairy. Other good birds included Band-rumped Swifts, a pair of Orange-fronted Barbets and an Indigo Flowerpiercer. The train was delayed, but there were many butterflies to try to photograph and the station guy was very polite and friendly. He showed us his pet which was no less than a Hoffman's Three-toed Sloth. What a cool animal! Finally the train arrived and we were on our way to the real wilderness of El Placer. Suddenly the train stopped inside a tunnel. A team of railway workers were reparing the track! After 45 minutes they were done, and after a while we finally reached the 7-house village **El Placer**. When we got off the train a man, Mario, offered us to stay at his home, and since camping sites seemed difficult to find we accepted his offer. We found a pair of beautiful

Moss-backed Tanagers and some White-thighed Swallows before rain ended the birding. Back at Mario's home (one small room), we soon went to bed. Daniel and I shared a big bed, and Mario and his son a smaller. This was really an adventure!

7/10 A full birding day in the exciting chocó forests. Two Berlepsch's Tinamous were heard, and among the many starbirds seen were 2 White-tipped Sicklebills, a male Lita Woodpecker, a pair of Spot-crowned Antvireos, a male Black-tipped Cotinga and Gray-and-gold-, Emerald-, Rufous-winged and Moss-backed Tanagers. Less spectacular were 1 Uniform Treehunter, 2 Common Tufted-Flycatchers, 1 Pacific Flatbill, 3 Checker-throated Antwrens, tons of Ochre-breasted Tanagers and 5 Tawny-faced Gnatwrens to name a few others. Great!

7/11 Another great birding day, with a chocó hat trick: Chocó Toucans, a pair of Chocó Woodpeckers and 4 undescribed (!!) Chocó Tapaculos. A Tiny Hawk chased a flock of 12 Rose-faced Parrots and 2 White-eyed Trogon females were seen with males heard. Two female Red-capped Manakins should have been males, but several other attractive birds rescued todays splash of color: 2 male Black-tipped Cotingas, a male Collared Trogon and a pair of Scarlet-and-white Tanagers (among several Tanagers). In the afternoon we met Marios neighbour Segundo in the forest with a shot Chocó Toucan, still alive and heartbrakingly screaming. Supper... In the evening we showed the guys our bird guide. They knew many birds (far too many!), reliably Long-wattled Umbrellabird and Baudó/Crested Guan. This was the last night and I could only hope that I would sleep at least 3 hours. The bed was hard as stone...

7/12 Morning birding didn't produce many new birds, only 2 Striped Woodhaunters, but possibly also the first Slate-headed Tody-Flycatcher seen in Ecuador!! The Tody-Flycatcher was seen rather briefly. Daniel didn't see much of it though, and the observation circumstances is too poor for official acceptance. The train came at about 10.00. Mario & Co. were going to Alto Tambo, we on the other hand to Ibarra and **Quito**, dirty and tired after hard birding days and far too little sleep. But what a journey!

7/13 After a good nights sleep we were fit for fight to bird the **Papallacta Pass**. At the pass the weather was windy and a bit rainy in the beginning. We flushed a Noble Snipe and a Tawny Antpitta, before heading towards the radio masts. Wind and rain increased, and after a while it was just horrible. Wet and frozen we started to walk back and down the road towards Quito for several kilometers. We were still frezing and no buses stopped (it was a Sunday). Fortunately a young pair from Quito picked us up, and drove us almost all the way to Casa Sueca! I spent my second evening with fever in bed...

7/14 Well needed rest in Quito.

7/15 At 07.00 we caught a Lago Agrio bus at Terminal Terrestre to drop us by the **San Rafael Falls** 5½ hours later. There we got a cheap room with two huge madrasses and nothing else in it. The fall was magnificent! Two Coppery-chested Jacamars were the best birds, other goodies were 1 female Wire-crested Thorntail, 1 Highland Motmot, 1 Lemon-browed Flycatcher, 4 Golden-collared Honeycreepers and Blue-browed, Golden-eared and Orange-eared Tanagers. We also saw an unidentified mammal. It was probably a Mountain Coati, but we only saw the animals head in front position before it just disappeared!

7/16 When waking up in the morning both Daniel and I found our wrists itching from about a hundred insect bites! How we got them is a mystery... Bird activity this morning was rather slow, nevertheless we found some great birds. Most notable was a Gray Tinamou that was seen very

good right by the trail. We also had great views of a female Amazonian Umbrellabird, 2 Green Hermits, 1 Bronzy Inca, 1 White-tipped Sicklebill (couldn't be closer!) and 5 Golden-eyed Flowerpiercers. A Short-tailed Antthrush sang for us. In the evening we were back in **Quito**.

7/17 In the afternoon we went to Santo Domingo and **Río Palenque**, where we arrived, after a few kilometers extra walk, at dusk.

7/18 A full day at Río Palenque, which started with rain. Since we had left our rubber boots in Quito our shoes got wet and dirty in an instance... Birding was frustrating, but we found a few goodies: 2 Rufous-fronted Wood-Quails (1 juv. seen very well), 3 White-necked Jacobins, 6 Pale-mandibled Aracaris, c. 10 Orange-fronted Barbets, 1 White-whiskered Puffbird, Blackheaded Antthrushes (heard) and 1 Chestnut-backed Antbird. Supper was our usual mix of tuna, eggs, carrots, bread, bananas, biscuits and water...

7/19 The morning once more started with rain with extremely slow birding later on. The only new birds were 1 male Guayaquil Woodpecker and 1 female Black-tailed Trogon. Our stay at the scientific station became a lot more expensive than expected - \$15/night! We felt kind of hustled and rather disappointed with the birding, so we left for Santo Domingo and Chone near the coast, where we arrived in the evening. In a few ponds just east of town we had lots of waterbirds, notably 5 Least Grebes, c. 10 Fulvous Whistling-Ducks, 1 Pinnated Bittern, c. 20 Purple Gallinules, c. 50 Wattled Jacanas and 8 Masked Water-Tyrants. A seemingly miserable day ended up in joy!

7/20 To find **Chone Lakes** as shown on the birding guide map was a hard task. Where the lakes were supposed to be we found nothing but pastures. Nevertheless there were many birds around: a flock of 20 Red-masked Parakeets flew by, and we also saw 1 male Green-breasted Mango and a pair of Black-crowned Tityras. Some locals pointed out the real direction of the lakes, where we found tons of Egrets (c. 2000), 3 White Ibises, 2 Pinnated Bitterns, 1 Anhinga and 1 Pearl Kite. By noon we caught a Guayaquil bus and got off at Jipijapa a few hours later. A really bad film with maximum volume made the trip to **Puerto Lopez** less funny. In Puerto Lopez we met a young english couple, with whome we shared a four bed (2 rooms) room for three nights at the cheapest hostería in town. In the evening we also booked a trip to Isla de la Plata, the exciting event of next day.

7/21 The boat that took us to **Isla de la Plata** (30 kms offshore) was small and the waves high. That's no good combination. I felt very sea sick the last hour... Isla de la Plata was great, though. We desperately wanted to walk the Waved Albatross trail, and stubborn as we were it became ours! Our first bird was a Long-tailed Mockingbird of the endemic race platensis. To walk in the seabird colony was extremely fun, the first birds being Masked and Blue-footed Boobies. The highlight was a Waved Albatross with a tiny chick just 2 meters from the trail, and later we saw three more adults (the whole population?)! From a viewing point we saw 4-6 ad. Red-billed Tropicbirds and 3 Humpback Whales. Our guide and staff pushed us forward all the time with the hereafter famous word "vamos!". Before departure we did some snorkeling (great experience!), and then we headed homewards. Halfway, 3 Killer Whales appeared right by the boat! Sea sick as I was, I puked shortly thereafter... Back in Puerto Lopez only the light memories of the day remained, and these were many, be sure of that!

7/22 Today's birding locality was **Ayampe River** and the tropical dry forest. Very good! Rarest were 2-3 Gray-backed Hawks (excellent views) and c. 20 Saffron Siskins. Other good birds were 1 Laughing Falcon (close!), c. 50 Red-masked Parakeets, 4 Pale-mandibled Aracaris, 1 Bluecrowned Motmot (also heard), 3 Red-billed Scythebills, c. 10 Speckle-breasted Wrens and many of the more common Tumbesian Endemics, i.e. Black-capped Sparrow, Gray-and-gold Warbler and Ecuadorian Piculet. Our last night in Puerto Lopez produced a massive roost of Gray-breasted Martins, at least 3500 birds! To find bread in the evening was an adventure...

7/23 We started the day with birding by the road south of **Ayampe**. The good forest was hard to access, and bird activity was slow. Good observations of 3 Violaceous Trogons, 2 Bat Falcons and 3 White-backed Fire-eyes were some of the highlights, we noted very few new species. At 10.30 we stopped a bus to continue south to **San Pablo** and **Monteverde Saltlakes**. It was very nice with some "normal birding" (using the telescope for the second time - the first was around Chone) for a change. Gray Gulls flew by and waders were present in good numbers. A Hudsonian Godwit was a surprise, more normal were the c. 10 Wilson's Plovers and c. 100 Short-billed Dowitchers. A Black-bellied Plover in full breeding plumage must have been newly arrived. In the afternoon we ended up in **La Libertad**, a rather dull and busy city, where we stayed at a fairly expensive hotel.

7/24 Shortly after dawn we took a taxi to **Punta Carnero**, less than 10 kms away, to watch for seabirds and beach waders. We didn't find very much, and thus took another taxi to drop us by the **Lagunas Ecuasal** - much better! Peruvian Pelicans were everywhere, maybe 500 birds altogether. Gull-billed and Elegant Terns numbered about 100 each, and there was also a flock of 61 Gray Gulls. In the central parts of the salinas the most interesting birds were found. Surprisingly at least 10 ad. summer-plumaged South American Terns (acting like breeding!) and a winter plumaged Red Knot were seen, both species very rare in Ecuador! A flock of 76 ad. Chilean Flamingos and 1 Kelp Gull were other goodies. In the nearby scrub we found 5 Burrowing Owls, 2 Lesser Nighthawks and 2 Short-tailed Field-Tyrants among others. By now the sun was high and the degree 36 C, so we went to the hotel and took a bus to **Guayaquil**. We passed Cerro Blanco on our way, hoping to see most of its species in southern Ecuador instead. In Guayaquil we took a bus to Quito. Egrets were abundant (1000s) and several Snail Kites (one did actually carry a snail!) were seen through the window. After a very long day we finally arrived to **Casa Sueca** in the middle of the night and got to bed at 01.30. La Costa was done!

7/25 Rest in **Quito**. A group of 20 americans had been sleeping in the house, resulting in vanished rubber boots(!) and some other stuff. I had a hole in one of my rubbers, so I had to buy new ones anyway. One of few places to buy rubber boots is near Terminal Terrestre in the old city, we were told, so I went there and bought rubbers and tickets to Loja. Sothern Ecuador was our next project!

7/26 For the first time we did a real tourist trip. We joined a swedish missionary family to the market of **Otavalo**! Great experience (though tons of tourists)! I bought a perfect, handsome jacket and a poncho for only \$20. We had to leave after a few hours, so we took a bus back and prepared ourselves for our 10 day trip due south. We travelled with Panamericana, who has the most comfortable buses in Ecuador, and left by 19.30.

7/27 We arrived at **Loja** at 09.45 after a 14 hour bus ride. A taxi then drove us all the way up to the refugio at **Cajanuma, Podocarpus NP**, which was our base for two nights. A british couple had been here for several days in terrible weather. This was their first day with sun! We birded the road and the loop trails in the afternoon. 3 Bearded Guans, 1 Flame-throated Sunangel and several species of Tanagers were cooperative. Thanks to Dick, the english guy, we could identify the song of a Chusquea Tapaculo - the second undescribed species of Tapaculo of our journey! We fell asleep early with great expectations for the next day...

7/28 Our expectations were to be fulfilled! The weather was great, and we had no trouble reaching the p ramo though it still was a bit windy. Poor englishmen that left today! The forest gave us

2 Glowing Pufflegs, 6 Barred Fruiteaters, very tame Pale-naped Brush-Finches and a Masked Mountain-Tanager (again!). Chusquea and Ocellated Tapaculos were heard. In the transition zone between elfin forest and páramo we found 2 Mouse-colored Thistletails, 1 Páramo Tapaculo and a female of our target species Neblina Metaltail! Great views impressed us at the top of the ridge where we flushed an Andean Snipe and got 2 male Neblina Metaltails. Afternoon birding was also great. By the road we found a soaring Black-and-chestnut Eagle, 1 male Purple-backed Thornbill, 1 Buff-breasted Mountain-Tanager, 2 male Red-hooded Tanagers and 1 male Chestnut-breasted Chlorophonia. By the loop trails we had excellent observations of 2 Chestnut-naped Antpittas and 1 Yellow-billed Cacique. At dusk we heard a Band-winged Nightjar and a Rufous-banded Owl. What a day!

7/29 Morning birding produced some new species: 2 White-browed Ground-Tyrants were totaly unexpected, while 1 Purple-throated Sunangel, 1 male Chestnut-breasted Coronet, 1 White-throated Quail-Dove and 3 Masked Trogons were other nice contributions to our list. We walked the 8 kilometers down to the main road and caught a bus to **Loja** where we drank one of many coca colas during the summer and filled up the Oreo-biscuit stock. **Zamora** and the **Bombuscaro** entrance of Podocarpus NP was 2 hours away. Late in the afternoon we arrived at the Bombuscaro refugio, where the staff offered us their beds so they could sleep at home for a change. The englishmen were also present!

7/30 The star bird of the day was undoubtedly the absolutely stunning White-breasted Parakeet, which was seen good both sitting and flying, about 20 birds altogether. During the day our list became rather impressive, though it was slow at many times: 1 Sickle-winged Guan, 1 pair of Torrent Ducks, 1 Ecuadorian Piedtail, 2 Black-streaked Puffbirds, 1 Lanceolated Monklet (cool bird!), 2 Orange-crested Flycatchers, 3 Gray-mantled Wrens, 2 male White-winged Tanagers and 1-2 Vermilion Tanagers were some of the best birds seen. Moreover, we saw lots of "89-butter-flies", and we even took a swim in the Bombuscaro River. Cold, but refreshing!

7/31 The morning was spent birding near the refugio. Good birds were 1 Brown Tinamou (heard), 1 Ecuadorian Piedtail, 1 Ruddy-tailed Flycatcher, 3 Andean Cock-of-the-rocks (2 males!), 1 female (of course) Blue-rumped Manakin and 2 Masked Tanagers. After a few hours we started to walk back to Zamora, 8 kms away. We missed our bus in spite of walking rather fast, but a taxi driver offered us a good price to Loja if he could get a full car. He soon did, and off we went back to **Loja**. Here we waited a couple of hours for a bus to Piñas on the west slope. The bus trip had the best music so far, and we arrived safely in **Piñas** in the evening.

8/1 At dawn we jumped off a bus at **Buenaventura**, 9 km. west of Piñas, where Spotted Nightingale-Thrushes and Andean Solitaires dominated the pleasant morning chorus. The forest of the Buenaventura area is severely fragmanted but still many birds are present. Actually we had one of our highest day totals here - 103 species. Mixed species flocks contained many good species like 4 Line-cheeked Spinetails, 1 Pacific Tuftedcheek, 3 species of Antshrike, 1 White-throated Spadebill, 1 Rufous-winged Tyrannulet and a female Golden-winged Manakin. Among many species of raptors overhead were 3 Gray-backed Hawks, 1 Great Black-Hawk and 1 Hookbilled Kite. Song Wrens entertained us with their amazing song, and Rufous-headed Chachalacas were also heard. Two different mammals appeared on almost the same spot, a Tayra (large marten) and a Central American Agouti! The target species of the day was naturally the El Oro Parakeet. They came in the afternoon. Daniel saw the flock of four birds pretty far away, but I only heard them... We hitchhiked back to Piñas late in the afternoon for our last night there. **8/2** Up early to catch a bus to **Loja**. We arrived at 10.28, with the only bus towards Sozoranga leaving at 10.30! I ran away to watch for the bus and Daniel waited for our baggage. With only seconds left we got on the next bus for another 4 ½ hour ride... We arrived at **Sozoranga**, 30 kms from the peruvian border, in the afternoon. We checked in at the only hotel in town, where Chestnut-collared Swallows nested. The evening was spent birding just east/northeast of town in scrub and remnant forest patches. A pair of Red-masked Parakeets flew by in superb light. Hummingbirds were plentiful. We had extreme observations of a Short-tailed Woodstar and, surprisingly, a female Little Woodstar. A male Woodstar was perhaps also a Little, but the literature didn't help us much. Moreover we found 1 White-headed Brush-Finch, 1 Black-cowled Saltator and a close-up Watkins' Antpitta. A Barn Owl appeared by the town plaza at dusk. What a good start!

8/3 Full day at Sozoranga. We started to walk towards Yaramine in darkness, with the sky just full of stars. In roadside scrub and forest (hard to get into) we saw many good species like 1 male Purple-collared Woodstar, 5 Scarlet-backed Woodpeckers, 2 Chapman's Antshrikes, 4 Elegant Crescent-chests, 6 Mouse-colored Tyrannulets, 1 Gray-breasted Flycatcher, 3 White-tailed Jays and 1 Black-cowled Saltator. Guayaquil Squirrels were also seen. In the afternoon we birded a ridge above the same road and found 2 Rainbow Starfrontlets and 4 Silver-backed Tanagers. In the evening we were invited to dance with some young ecuadorians. I went there, but Daniel stayed at the hotel. Cool experience, but the dancing was unfortunately westernized.

8/4 At 04.15 we started a walk that was to last much longer than expected. The birdwatching guide told us that the distance to **Tambo Negro** is 10 kms. The village Sabiango should be halfway. We arrived at Sabiango around 07.00, despite fast downhill walking! At least we saw our first Graycheeked Parakeets. It was probably the first time two gringos passed the military checkpoint at Sabiango by foot! Finally at Tambo Negro, by 09.15 we had a coke at a medical station. The 10 kilometers must have been about 22!!! The birding spirit was rather low, not least after we'd met a local that warned us to wade across the river without rubber boots. He invited us to eat coco nut and papaya, which was very nice of him. Daniel didn't feel well, so we took a bus (not uncommon in that direction) back to Sozoranga. Before leaving we did find some good birds: 2 Ochre-bellied Doves (one of our target species), 3 White-edged Orioles, 5 White-tailed Jays, 2 Short-tailed Hawks and Gray-cheeked and Red-masked Parakeets. Back at the military checkpoint we didn't have to show our passports - they were merely smiling at us... In the afternoon Daniel rested when I birded. The birds were mostly like the day before, but I found i.e. 3 Purple-collared Woodstars and a Pacific Elaenia. Very tired after 30 kms of walking, I retired early. Tomorrow was going to be another long day.

8/5 At 06.00 we left Sozoranga for the nearby locality **Utuana**, at a higher elevation. Hummingbirds were common, especially the beautiful Purple-throated Sunangel. We also saw 3 female Green-tailed Trainbearers and 4 Silver-backed Tanagers. We didn't stay very long and failed finding any of the rare birds that have been seen here. At 10.30 we took a bus to the now familiar bus terminal of **Loja**, where we found another one going home to Quito. The night on the bus was horrible. First they showed a distgusting film (I tried not to watch it), then I only had my t-shirt and the rest of my stuff on the roof. It was very cold, and I didn't get any sleep at all! We arrived at **Casa Sueca** at 06.45. The first thing I did was taking a hot shower!

8/6 Sleep, rest and lots of food in Quito.

8/7 We just had to make a try (kind of desperate!) to see at least one species of Mountain-Toucan on our journey, so we went to **Bella Vista**. This time we didn't walk, a man in Nanegalito drove us there for a cost of \$10. Bella Vista was great! Hummingbird feeders were everywhere, which was a big surprise for us. WHY is this the only place in this hummer-country to have hummingbird feeders? To watch totally unaware Buff-tailed Coronets and Gorgeted Sunangels from a distance of 15 centimeters was such an incredibly amazing experience! Among other hummers were Collared Incas (superb observations, but not as close as the above mentioned) and a female Fawn-breasted Brilliant. We finally got to see 3 Plate-billed Mountain-Toucans (YES! Superb birds!), and we also found 1 Barred Forest-Falcon, 1 Toucan Barbet and 1 Rufous-headed Pygmy-Tyrant. But the day wasn't over. At dusk we both heard and saw an amazing male Swallow-tailed Nightjar, and when it got all dark we heard 1 Colombian Screech-Owl, 1 Mottled Owl and 1 Common Potoo! Excellent!

8/8 The day started with both Lyre-tailed and Swallow-tailed Nightjars heard! Otherwise it was rather slow. We missed 2 Beautiful Jays, but saw 4 Turquoise Jays, 1 Plate-billed Mountain-Toucan, 3 Grass-green Tanagers and 3 Golden-rumped Euphonias. Three merry and kind girls were cooking the food in absence of the chef who was on vacation. Though we were running out of money and just wanted the breakfast, the girls spoiled us and even made lunch packets for our walk (downhill) to the main road. We would have liked to stay longer, but we had to say farewell at 10.30. Back in **Casa Sueca** we packed our bags for our last big adventure, 3 ¹/₂ days at La Selva Lodge! One third of our total budget was invested in this outrageously expensive trip, so we had great expectations...

8/9 The plane to **Coca** departed on time, at 08.00. At 09.30 we started our 3 hour boat ride down the Napo River. On our way we saw several species, remarkably a male Yellow-hooded Blackbird. There are no previous official (but unofficial) records in Ecuador, but as we saw the bird in front position it should be almost impossible to confuse it with Oriole Blackbird. Finally at **La Selva** we first checked in and after that met our superb birdwatching guide José, (who was the main reason to chose La Selva). From the beginning we were 7 people in the "hard birder group", the figure dropped to 4 later on. The afternoon was primarily spent in the canopy tower. José has a very good knowledge in bird sounds, but you had to ask him to know what bird that was singing most of the time. Some of the birds seen were 1 Double-toothed Kite, 2 Black-headed Parrots, Lettered and Many-banded Aracaris, 1 male Spangled Cotinga, 1 Cinereous Mourner and 2 Olive Oropendolas. Many species were heard, including 4 species of Tinamou, Red-throated Caracara and Rufous-capped Antthrush. After the delicious supper we went owling. We heard 5 Tawny-bellied Screech-Owls and 1 Spectacled Owl, while1 Pauraque and 1 Rufescent Tiger-Heron were spotlighted. Our first day had come to an end.

8/10 Up before dawn to have an early breakfast. After that we got lunch packets and headed to Río Napo. On our way we heard a Ringed Woodpecker which soon was seen flying across Lake Garzacocha, and we also heard a Cream-colored Woodpecker. From the boardwalk we heard a Gray-necked Wood-Rail and by the boats we saw a few Black-mantled Tamarins and Common Squirrel-Monkeys. First we looked for Parrots at the salt licks, which unfortunately were almost deserted. At the river edge was a Spix's Guan and a male Plum-throated Cotinga. We soon arrived at the landing place for one of the famous trails on the southern side of Río Napo. Now the real birding began. With the help of José the 4-5 hour walk gave us an impressive list of birds: 1 White-eared Jacamar was seen at the forest egde and shortly thereafter we saw a pair of Brown Nunlets and a male Golden-collared Toucanet. Deeper inside the forest we were lucky to find army ants, which of course means lots of Antbirds! Bicolored, Lunulated, Scale-backed and Sooty Antbirds were seen very well and Daniel had the great luck of seeing 2 White-plumed Antbirds... We heard 1 Hairy-crested Antbird, 1 Ochre-striped Antpitta, 1 Noble Antthrush and several Rusty-

belted Tapaculos. Among other birds seen here were 1 Straight-billed Hermit, 1 Black-tailed Leaftosser, 1 Gray Antwren, 1 Black-faced Antthrush, 2 White-chested Puffbirds and 3 Dusky-capped Greenlets. For a while after this rush it was rather slow, and then the birds came again, i.e. 1 Great Jacamar, 1 Yellow-browed Antbird, 1 Brownish Twistwing and 3 Long-billed Gnatwrens. After this superb walk we went to one of the nearby river islands to see 1 Large-billed Tern, 2 Ladder-tailed Nightjars, 1 Lesser Hornero, 1 Lesser Wagtail-Tyrant, 2 Castelnau's Antshrikes and 2 Dusky-cheeked Foliage-gleaners. Back at the lodge the hardiest birders (a german and us) walked to the canopy tower to find 2 male Spangled Cotingas, 1 White-necked Puffbird and a mixed species flock containing Opal-rumped, Opal-crowned and Paradise Tanagers as well as 1 Yellow-bellied Dacnis and 1 White-lored Euphonia. After the supper buffet we heard a Great Potoo and summed up the day list to about 150 species. Not bad at all!!

8/11 Today we started to walk to Lake Mandicocha (1 roosting Great Potoo, 1 male Plain-throated Antwren and 1 female Plain-winged Antshrike by the trail), where we took a boatride on the Mandiyacu stream. Azure Gallinules were seen very well by the lake, and by the stream we saw several nice birds with the help of José and his tape recorder. A pair of Dot-backed Antbirds came very close, as did a pair of Yellow-crowned Elaenias. Plumbeous Antbirds were harder to get a good view at, and we had almost given up hope to see the Cocha Antshrike when a male suddenly was heard at a distance. José taped it in to be watched under good circumstances! We also saw Red Howler Monkeys. On our way back to the lake we saw 1 White-chinned Jacamar, 2 overflying Blue-and-yellow Macaws and 1 Várzea Mourner. When the boatride was finished we splitted up in two groups, one going to the canopy tower and the other into the forest. José, the germans, Daniel and I chosed the forest. An Ornate Hawk-Eagle soared high above us, visible only for a few seconds but heard for a long time. A pair of Sapphire Quail-Doves was seen very well, and we also found Spot-winged, Cinereous and Dusky-throated Antshrikes, a male Casqued Oropendola and a few Dusky Titi Monkeys. In the afternoon we had great views of a newly fledged Zigzag Heron and 2 Pygmy Marmosets by the lodge. After that we went boating around Garzacocha to see 4 Ivory-billed Aracaris (close!), lots of Hoatzins, 1 Rufous-breasted Hermit and 1 Green-and-rufous Kingfisher and 1 Boat-billed Heron to the lucky, myself not included. Well, I did see the Kingfisher (that it was a bird, that is) and I heard the wingbeats of the Heron... Evening owling produced 1 Black-banded Owl, 2 Crested Owls and 5 Ferruginous Pygmy-Owls heard, but the only thing we saw was the nightly creature Kincajou. One day left!

8/12 Today we went to the opposite side of the river again. During the night many of the guests at La Selva began to feel sick. The most safe and expensive place was ironically the place where we got a really bad stomach! For me it was no problem, but Daniel had a hard time. A flock of Scarletshouldered Parrotlets flew by at a distance just before we reached the boardwalk. Too bad we couldn't see their beauty. At the forest edge on the other side of the river we found 1 Variegated Flycatcher and 2 Chestnut-eared Aracaris, but José took the price with a male Rufous-headed Wood-pecker! Unfortunately the bird disappeared before anyone else could see it, but at least we got to hear it... Inside the forest we were lucky to find army ants once again! Despite Daniel's illness he found his third White-plumed Antbird among Bicolored, Sooty and Lunulated Antbirds. It disappeared as usual, and I was very close to get a serious nerve brake! Suddenly 2 birds appeared right on the trail, and the story got a lucky ending (with 2 more birds seen!). Spectacular birds indeed! Our Antbird list grew considerably during the day, with Undulated, Fasciated and Mouse-colored Antshrikes, Gray, Warbling, Silvered and Spot-backed Antbirds and Rufous-tailed Antwren seen. Our miserable male Manakin-list could add a heard Wire-tailed Manakin, not much of a comfort... During a shower we could watch 4 Scarlet Macaws and the uncommon Monk Saki Monkey, the latter being a very odd creature! In the afternoon we went to a river island further downriver to look for Amazonian Umbrellabirds, but we only found a Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl.

Back at Garzacocha we saw a male Scale-breasted Woodpecker, our 5:th Celeus in three days! There was one hour of light left, but we were just too tired to do any more birding.

8/13 After breakfast we headed straight to the boats to be transported back to Coca and Quito. We took farewell to the Amazon forest and its birds. Our 3:rd seen Great Potoo, 4 Blue-and-yellow Macaws and a singing White-shouldered Antbird were some of the last birds noted. During the boattrip we found 1 Black Skimmer and 1 Capped Heron, both species rather unexpected. Problems met us at the airport in **Coca**. Our plane was "broken", so we had to wait for 5 hours for the next available flight! La Selva payed for dinner at a restaurant, and at the airport we found c. 10 Redbreasted Blackbirds and 3 Pectoral Sandpipers. We finally arrived to **Quito** at 17.30. Our total list for the La Selva trip ended up at c. 250 species, a good result, much thanks to José.

8/14 Rest, shopping and photographing in the old town of Quito.

8/15 We just had to do another try at the **Papallacta Pass**. At the pass the weather was bad as usual, so we continued to the lake where we found 29 Yellow-billed Pintails, 25 Andean Teals, 5 Páramo Seedeaters and 2 Shining Sunbeams. The sky miraculously cleared up, so we took a bus to the pass where we found 2 ad. Andean Condors after just a few minutes! Wow! The radio masts were barely visible, so we didn't even think of walking up there again. However, instead of Rufous-bellied Seedsnipes, we found 1 male Blue-mantled Thornbill, 3 Ecuadorian Hillstars and 2 Andean Tit-Spinetails which was just as good! This time we didn't freeze too much, and buses were not full, so we got to Quito again in the afternoon with plenty of time for packing. Our two months in Ecuador had come to an end.

8/16 We spent our last sucres on a bus to La Carolina to take some "panic photos" of common birds and people. The swedish missionaries that took us to Otavalo were at Casa Sueca again. They helped us to get to the airport with all our baggage and saw that we got away safely. This time we flew to Bogotá, then to Paris and Stockholm, where our families met us at the airport. Full of memories of our many adventures, the images and sounds of 872 species of birds in our heads, and of much lighter weight (I had lost 10 kilos!), we were both glad and sad of being back in Sweden again. But one thing's for sure. There will be more journeys to South America!
