Trip report Southern Africa

October 24 – November 18 2001 Lars Hansson & Göran Andersson Sweden

Summary

3½ tremendous weeks in southern Africa with most of the time in Namibia. As the flight cost directly to Windhoek was as expensive as via Cape Town it was easy to add a few days extra there. Afterwards it can be said that we should have 1-2 days more in Cape.

No problem with air flights, the car worked without any male function, no flat tires. Very good food. Ice-cream almost every day. We camped 6 nights, some nights because nothing else was to get, some nights because the bungalows werw rented-out.

We drove 1400 km in Cape province and 5300 km in Namibia-Botswana.

We had a total of 454 species (including subspecies of Albatross etc).

Day per day

Oct 24-25 – cape of Good Hope day

After a 20 hours trip from our Swedish door to Cape Town with British Airways and South African Airways we picked up our rental car from National Car rental and headed to *Kirschtenbosch* for the first birding hours. There we met Claire Spottiswoode who was kind enough to meet us with her and Callan Cohen's birding guide to the Cape province. Together they run Birding Africa.

We walked the botanic garden for a couple of hours, mainly for **Cape sugarbird** and **Orangebreasted Sunbird**, that both took some time to locate. We also had sightings of **Lesser Double-collared Sunbird**, **Redwinged Starling**, **Cape Robin**, **Sombre Bulbul** and **Black Saw-Wing Swallow**, among many.

Claire told us about a good place for the **Knysna Warbler** just a few kilometers from Kirschtenbosch, so we headed there before going down to the coast. The warbler didn't answer to our tape but when a dog passed it started to sing. We didn't bother to try and see it and headed down to *Cape of Good Hope* instead. This place really fulfilled all expectations as a thrilling place – we had full storm, with the saltwater raining and the wind shook the car. We saw our first **Sabine's Gull** and **Cape Gannets** and after some effort a pair of **African Oystercatchers**. In the last daylight we twitched the **Jackass Penguin** in the colony, near our hotel in Simon's Town. We stayed at the Central Hotel, a nice B&B hotel close to the pelagic meeting point.

Oct 26 – Karoo day

Started early when meeting Christian De Boix at Kirschtenbosch for a trip north into the Karoo scrubland and semi desert. This area is reachable for a daytrip if you stop around the *Karoopoort*. We had a few stops in the mountains and scrubland south-west for birds like **African Black Swift**, , **Rufous-eared Warbler**, **Southern Red Bishop**, **Yellowrumped Widow**, **Cape Weaver** and also heard a **Rock Pipit** and saw 2 **Peregrine Falcons**. This was a very good start on learning larks and also pleasant sighting on **Southern Black Korhaan** in display flight.

In the area around Karoopoort and Eierkop we had splendid sightings of invading **Blackeared Finchlarks**, as well as a pair of **Ludwig's Bustards** and **Verreaux's Eagle**. Among others worth mentioned is **Karoo Robin**, **Cinnamonbreasted Warbler**, and **Greybacked Cisticola**. At *Eierkop* hill Christian was successful to bring 2 **Karoo Eremomelas** up-front with help from a tape recorder. Close to Eierkop is a rather large dam that included **Great Crested Grebe**, **Southern Pochard**, **Maccoa Duck**, **Yellow-billed Duck** and **Cape Shoveler**. We had lunch in the *Katbakkies* ravine where we had **African Marsh Warbler**, **Fairy Flycatcher**, **Layard's Titbabbler** and good sighting of **Rock Pipit**.

After a new run out on the plain we headed home over the mountains towards Ceres where in the last daylight we had a **Ground Woodpecker** and in the headlights of the car a **Cape Eagle-Owl**.

Oct 27 – Cape province day trip

Started bad. The planned pelagic trip was cancelled due to bad weather and the fact that the weather looks to be much better tomorrow. One of the organizers of the pelagic, John Graham, took us on a trip inland instead. We had originally planned this for tomorrow but you can't do anything about the weather. Due to this we missed 2-3 hours of morning birding. We headed up to *Sir Lawry's Pass* and were almost blown away! It was difficult to move and even more to hear/see birds around the rocks. We moved onto the calm side of the rocks and after some 20 minutes we found a family of **Cape Rockjumper** with one juvenile. That became it for us at Sir Lawry's, the wind was too much and we headed towards *Grootvanderbosch* instead. During the trip we stopped for birds like **Martial Eagle** and **Blue**

Crane. On the way up to the nature reserve we had Yellow-billed Duck, Burchell's Coucal, African Black Sunbird, Cape Weaver, Southern Red Bishop and Yellowrumped Widow. In the fields around the entrance we had Swee Waxbill and Greater Double-collared Sunbird. Down in the forest we had good sightings of Forest Buzzard and Olive Woodpecker and heard several Knysna Woodpeckers. The forest also produced a ½ hour battle with a Knysna Warbler and finally 1 of 4 had seen half of the bird on a distance of 3-4 meters away. What a sculker! That bird takes the price! Other species in the forest were Cape Batis, Olive Bushshrike, Forest Canary, Cape Siskin and Bluemantled Flycatcher. Further on up in the reserve we managed to see Victorin's Warbler, Yellowthroated Warbler and Southern Boubou.

On the flatlands around *De Hoop* we had both **Stanley Bustard** and **Karoo Korhaan** later during the day.

The day also gave sightings of **White-throated Swallow** and **Pearl-breasted Swallow**. We headed home to Cape Town in a thunderstorm with heavy rain. Wonder what happens tomorrow with the pelagic...

Oct 28 – pelagic magic!!

Started better than 27th and got even better !! At 06:45 we met up at the pier for run-through before the boat trip. As John Graham said this was the first time in rain – and it was raining all the way through False Bay and way out at sea. We where greeted by **Cape Gannets** and a few **Bank Cormorants**. The first cry for 'albatross' was soon heard as a **Shy Albatross** came close, but it was still raining and the cameras were still under deck. We soon also had more and more **Greater Shearwaters** and **White-chinned Petrels** around the boat and it was estimated that we had approx. 6000 Greater Shearwaters during the day !! The first **European** and **Wilson's Storm-Petrels** were also around, as well as **Pintado Petrels** and **Subantarctic Skua**.

The skipper soon found a few trawlers on radar and we headed towards them, followed by many **Black-browed Albatross**, a few of both **Indian** and **Atlantic Yellow-nosed Albatross**, by the South Africans considered as separate species now. Both **Antarctic** and **Hall's Giant Petrel** came close during the day.

After a few hours we where heading towards a new trawler when Göran made the guides aware of a smaller shearwater that he saw as we passed it. He was sure it wasn't a **Manx Shearwater**, that we had seen 1-2 during the day, so the boat turned as it might be a Yelkouan Shearwater. It was a long shot for a <u>very</u> rare bird and to find it again. But after just a few minutes Trevor screamed from the top of his lungs; **YELKOUAN SHEARWATER** !!!!!!! - and the panic broke out among (most) the southern african birders. The majority onboard were from Europe and we knew it was a big rarity, but as it's quite common in the Mediterranean I guess most of us had seen it before. When it was better seen, it was confirmed as a **Balearic Shearwater**, one of the recent split from the nominant Yelkouan. This was the 3rd record for Southern Africa but the 2 before had been specimen recorded, so this was the first visual sighting ever.

After this rouse the skipper saw that a trawler was collecting the trawl so we headed there and just after a few minutes Trevor shouted again – and this time we Europeans enjoyed it more...A subadult **Northern Royal Albatross** came in and we saw this magnificent pelagic bird 2-3 times more around the trawlers.

During the way back we where greeted by a single **Dusky Dolphin** and **Oceanic Sunfish** and landed in Simon's Town harbor at 3.30pm with a pair of **African Oystercatchers** in the harbor.

Oct 29 – Hello Namibia!

Found us returning the rental car and flying to Windhoek in Namibia. It had been a long weekend of hectic birding with guides and friends but now we where on our own. We got the luggage and got out on a quite small airport and found our self without any pick-up from the rental car agency. I called Jumbo Car Hire and said that we where at Eros, where is the pick-up? And that explained it, Eros is a domestic airport inside Windhoek where the Cape Town flight also landed, the pick-up were at the international airport!

After picking up the car and filling up supplies we headed out to *Daan Viljoen nature reserve* where we raised our tent and birded along the hiking trails during the day. We had good sightings of many species but nothing that we didn't have further on, like **Rockrunner**. Also the first encounters of mammals like **Zebra, Eland and Kudu.**

Oct 30 – Plover day!

started early as our first experience of the Namibian night was quite cold. We drove the Game Drive at first light and had our first (of many) **Red-billed Hornbills, Great Sparrows**, as well as **Giraffe**. The drive was very nice with good photo opportunities and a good start on the Namibian bird life.

At 11 we started the trip on B2 towards *Swakopmund* where we found the Langstrand resort in between Swakop and *Walvis Bay*, where we arranged room for 2 nights.

As we headed down the main road towards Walvis 3 **Damara Terns** passed the road just in front of us. South of Walvis, as the mudflats begins, we had **Lesser Flamingo**, **Pied Avocet**, **White fronted Plover** and **Caspian Tern**. When we got to the salt works we took the road to the right that lead out on the mudflats/salinas. Drove many kilometers with **Little Stints** and quite long out the first group of **Chestnut-banded Plover**.

Oct 31 – desert larks day!

Started at the guano platform between Langstrand and Walvis Bay, a good stop in the morning light. We had trip-species like **Whimbrel** and **Ruddy Turnstone** as well as more sightings of **Damara Tern** and our only **Crowned Cormorants**.

But today was one of these lark-days and first on the list was **Dune Lark**, so we headed out of Walvis towards the airstrip and Rooidam. Turning off hear towards *Rooibank* we had heard of bad road but it was under repair and had got much better so it was no problem to speed 60-70 with our 2WD the 20 km to the oasis. Parked the car and walked due south until the trees turned into bushes and scrubs and the desert dunes rose in front of us. There we soon had 3 Dune Larks close. It is wise to take this as soon as possible in the day, it was hot already at 09:30-10:00.

After breakfast we went touristing on the *Welwitschia Drive* with stop at the moonlandscape before heading into the Welwitschia plains and the 1500 year old grand-welwitschia where we had lunch. Even though this is mostly desert there are birds here as well, this time very curious and "tame" Namibian race of **Tractrac Chat** that made the camera work. Our research show that they like tuna...

Second important lark on the list is the **Gray's Lark** and therefore we headed 50-60 km east of Swakop on the B2 where according to Danish trip reports from early '90 should be good for this lark. We had literally <u>nothing</u> in this area and we gave up around 5pm. I called a birder in Swakop that had given me his telephone number on e-mail to Sweden. I had tried the night before without luck but now he was at home and he described his best spot for us. At 6:15pm we where north of the salt work, north of Swakop and 6:40pm we left with 4 close sightings of the Gray's. Lark-day complete!! See stake-out section for info on this place.

Nov 1 – Herero day!

We left at 05 in mist and understood that we had had good weather in the Swakop area. Headed up to the *Spitzkoppe* area and had heard that the road going in from B2 should be good for larks and **Rueppell's Korhaan**, so we where there around 7am. Found 2 korhaans as well as approx. 30 **Stark's Larks.** Arrived Spitzkoppe around 9am and it was already very hot and no wind at all. Primary target for this area is the **Herero Chat** and we walked the area my friend in Swakop had told me about and after some 20 min. we found 2 of them, as well as the only Namibian sightings of **Layard's Titbabbler.**

After some more birding before it got too hot we headed towards Omaruru on the main road and Hotel Staebe – the owners there should have knowledge about the Hartlaub's Francolin. To our disappointment the owners where on holiday and there substitute couldn't help us. We headed out on the C36 towards some rocks that looked good and we had good birding around the road but no chance of getting near the cliffs. Back at the hotel we discovered a stake-out in a 11 year old trip report and speeded out to check it in the last daylight. See stake-out section for info. The moral of this is to check older reports before entering an area...

Nov 2 – Hartlaub day!

Started again at 5am as you should be at the **Hartlaub's Francolin** place before sunrise. We found the place again and walked up as described in the stake-out section. It didn't take long before we heard the first group and soon we had fairly good sightings of 3 groups, that where "singing" well after sunrise. We also encountered our only group of **White-tailed Shrikes** here.

Back for a splendid breakfast before leaving Omaruru for the drive up to Etosha and the Okaukuejo camp where we where around 2pm and ready with the tent around 3pm, close to a big **Social Weaver** nest. Took a drive to the west plains that had many **Chestnut-backed** and **Gray-backed Finchlarks**, as well as **Spotted dikkops** and mammals like **springbok** in abundance.

Back for buffet dinner and down to the waterhole for **elephants**, **black rhinos**, **jackals** and over 100 **Double-banded Sandgrouse** coming in to drink and our first **Rufous-cheeked Nightjars**. We also saw 2 **Giant Eagle-Owls**, that apparently is stationary around this waterhole at night.

Nov 3 – lion day!

The gate opened at sunrise and we took a loop ride during the first hours with a close look at a **Secretary-bird** before collecting the tent and headed towards Halali, via many waterholes. Good birding that included a sighting of a **Rufous-eared Warbler** from the relict population in Etosha. The main attraction today must be the 3 female **lions** that rested under a big tree at Rietfontein waterhole. What a thrill !! Our first sighting of the magnificent **Kori Bustard** was at the same waterhole. Other mammals during the day were the endangered **Black-faced Impala** that is common in Etosha, as well as Africa's smallest antelope, the **Damara Dik-Dik.**

Found Halali camp much calmer than Okaukuejo and rented a bungalow for 2 nights. Found the camp waterhole much more thrilling and better for **black rhino** but not as good for the great amount of animals. We where told that Halali has the best chance for leopard/Cheetah at night waterhole. We also had a **Spotted Hyena** coming in to drink and a stationary **Marsh Owl**.

Nov 4 – Kori Bustard day!

Started the day with a walking trip around the camp and up on the hill close by. Didn't find any of the key species, the Southern Violet Woodhoopoe or the Blackfaced Babbler but did find a roosting **African Scops-Owl** with the help from a garden worker. Headed out to Goas WH where we had our only sighting of **Cape Teal**. Turned around at Springbokfontein WH and headed back to Rietfontein WH in search of the lions from yesterday.

They where gone but today it was vulture meeting with 7-8 **Lappet-faced Vulture** and quite many **African White-backed Vulture** and all of a sudden also a landing **Egyptian Vulture**, a quite rare bird in Namibia. It was a 2 calendar bird that stood at the waterhole for some 30 minutes and had gained height when we left the waterhole. We also had hunting **Little Sparrowhawk** and Lanner at this waterhole. Headed back on the Rhino drive without anything special and ended the day, again at Goas waterhole with a heard of **Elephants**. During the day we had 12 different individuals of **Kori Bustards** !!. Another night at the Halali waterhole produced a calling **White-faced Owl**, the stationary **Marsh Owl**, 3 **black rhinos** and together with a **Spotted Hyena** a **African Wild Cat**.

Nov 5 – Lion day again!

Started as yesterday with a walking trip around Halali, now with a family of **Southern Violet Woodhoopoe**, up to 10 birds, mostly juveniles. Also a good friend from back home, **Eurasian Golden Oriole**. Again a garden warden approached me and showed a roosting **White-faced Owl**. I also checked the **African Scops-Owl** and it was still in the same tree. As the wardens know about the owls, my guess is that they have the same tree from day to day, see the stake-out section for info on these owls.

Headed to Goa waterhole and then towards *Namutoni* for another nights camping, now on grassy field. 5 **Blue Cranes** where seen at the Namutoni waterhole and 3 more at Klein Namutoni waterhole. At this waterhole we where approached by another car that told us that there where many **lions** under a tree nearby and that they would come to drink in a few hours. We say 1 female right away and took the dik-dik drive to "kill" some time. Nice drive but didn't produce that much birds in the early afternoon. The area around Namutoni must be the most **giraffe** populated area in Etosha, we had 30 at the same time around the waterhole and at least 1 had watch out for the lions. After a 30 min wait a **Kudu** started "barking" and the giraffes became more nervous than ever and they where right — a young male Lion approached the waterhole and drank for 10 minutes. It returned to the tree and after 15 minutes more lions came down until it was 11 lions around the waterhole some 30 meters away. We also had a **spotted hyena** lying nearby, waiting for the lions to go away. During this time we also had a new experience — the thunderstorm that arise turned into a sandstorm with a visual sight of some 3-4 meters.

Nov 6 – Burchell day!

Started with a *dik-dik* drive that produced quite many birds, as **Crested Francolin** and the only sighting of a group of **Blackfaced Babblers** flying away. Not a very pleasant sighting. As we had a 400 km trip ahead we headed north towards the Andoni plains exit (Nehale) from Etosha and had **Burchell's Sandgrouse** and **Redbreasted Swallows** along the way. When we arrived we discovered that this exit had been closed for several years.

NOTE: Do not trust the official map that you can by in Etosha, there are only 2 gates to/from Etosha.

The road north towards Ruacana was good but with many cattle in the "3rd world", i.e. when you have crossed the red line veterinary check you have to watch for cattle. Bought supplies in *Ruacana* shop and BP station before heading out to *Omunjandi camp* at the Cunene river, on the Angolan border. We where alone in the nice campsite. Before sunset we explored the Palm forest close by for the Rufous-tailed Palm-Thrush, without any luck but there where a single **Red-necked Francolin** as well as family groups of **Vervet monkey**.

Nov 7 – Cinderella day!

Started at the bigger palm forest without anything except a **Bluegrey Flycatcher** and a small grayish falcon that might have been the gray Falcon. Moved a couple of 100 meters to the more open palms, as described in the stake-out section. After almost 1 hour many birds started to call from a palm, might have been an owl there and among these birds where 3 **Rufous-tailed Palm-Thrushes**.

First of the key species was celebrated by breakfast before heading up the dry riverbed for **Cinderella Waxbill** – and our luck proceeded with a total of 8 individuals !! Also had a few **Olive Bee-eaters** here. After a photo session with the waxbills we headed down already at 10. Note: Both these key-species are probably easiest in the morning, especially the Thrush and it's very warm in this part of the country, so if you want both species and aren't as lucky as we were, be prepared to have 2 nights up here. It's a good birding area so it's not a waste of time to check out this area. The cliffs at the Cinderella should also be good for Hartlaub's Francolin, I've been told.

We left the northwest with an uninteresting trip down to Grootfontein an Hotel Club Med.

Nov 8 – Temminck's Courser day!

Arrived Rundu after a long drive and settled at Ngandu safari lodge before heading out to the Sewage works and golf club. It was quite hard to find along the old main road towards Caprivi strip as the golf club was demolished but when you have left Rundu and find water collections on the left, that is the sewage works. Here we had many waterbirds, as **Knob-Billed Duck**, **Hottentot Teal**, **Curlew Sandpiper**, **Greater Painted-snipe** and in the surrounding golf course **Swainson's Francolin**, **Temminck's Coursers**, **Senegal Coucal**, **Buffy Pipit** and **Shaft-tailed Whydahs**.

Nov 9 – Pratincole day!

Started at Rundu SW before supply shopping at Spar shop in Rundu, last major shopping before Caprivi and Botswana. The birds at SW where the same as yesterday. Drove the main road towards Divundu with a planned stop at the well-knowned radio mast for miombo woodland. We found the area just around the mast to be cultivated and full of villages so we headed on until we stopped at the 100 km to Divundo sign and walked in that untouched forest. Again, we had very warm and calm winds so you literally have to step on the birds to find them! We had new species like **Black Cuckoo-shrike** and a pair of **Chinspot Batis** with female on egg.

We arrived at the nice and very friendly *Ngepi lodge* around 1pm and put up the tent for 2 nights and birded from the campsite over the Okavango river until 3pm with **Broad-billed Roller** and **Striped Cuckoo**.

The road from Divundu turnoff to Ngepi turnoff is very bad for a 2WD and Popa Falls is in between these two places. We birded the rest of the day at Popa Falls. We started at the badly signed reserve to go to the right along the fence to below the falls, with **African Pied**Wagtails and Brown Firefinches. Right away we had kids wanting to ship us over to the island in the middle of the falls for Rock Pratincole, they knew how to make money. They wanted N\$40 for 2 people but we said no and hoped to see them from land. You will probably see them much better from the island but remember that you then enter a breeding site for a bird that only breeds in very small numbers here. After this we birded on the tracks to the west side with birds like White-faced Whistling-Duck, Arrow-marked Babbler,

Orangebreasted bushshrike and Thickbilled Weaver before standing at the top of the falls at 6pm and having 4 Rock Pratincoles.

O the small road leading to the Ngepi camp we had many **African Quailfinches** being flogged by a farmer, didn't see any on ground. See stake-out section for description.

Nov 10 – Crane day!

Started before sunrise at the tent. After some paperwork we entered the *Mahango reserve* at 7am as 1st car for today and during the first part of the drive we had mammals like a feeding **Hippo** on land and **Sabel**. Birds there where a few **African Openbilled Stork** and the first **Southern Carmine Bee-eaters** where seen, as well as a single **Long-toed Plover**. Had a stop at the large *Baobab tree* where we found the breeding pair of **Wattled Cranes** with it's juvenile!! Here also a few more **Brown Firefinches**. Headed towards the *Kwetche picnic site* where there were **Tsessebees** and up to 7 **Hippos** at the same time and one **Yellow-billed Stork**. As we sat outside the car, overlooking the river, al of a sudden a large **elephant** rushes down to the water just 20 meters from us! Thrilling experience. Other birds during the trip were **Bearded Robin, Blackbacked Cisticola** and a pair of **Orangebreasted Waxbills**. Back at the camp for some hours during the day produces many species on the tent-list, among them the first **African Skimmers**, a single **Black Egret** and **Meyer's Parrot** and **Bradfield's Hornbill** in the trees.

Back to Popa Falls for another run at the **Rock Pratincoles**, this time with spotting scope and better but shorter views of another 4. **Orangebreasted Bushshrikes** again today. On the way home we managed to see a few **African Quailfinches** on ground at the same place as yesterday.

Nov 11 – Okavango night specials, not !!

Started with (among others) Yellow-billed Stork and a pair of African Golden Oriole from the camp, After checking out we headed to miombo woodlands close to the Mahango reserve station, where we had Greater Honeyguide and Rufous-bellied Tit.

No problem through the border and checked in at *Shakawe fishing lodge* around 12am. Birded around the camp and before the night settled we found species like **Striated Heron**, **Little Bitterns**, **African Mourning Dove**, **Malachite Kingfisher**, **White-fronted Bee-eater**, **Wire-tailed Swallow**, **Banded Martin**, **Golden-Weaver**, **Yelloweyed Canary** and even more **Brown Firefinches**.

We had 3 course dinner at 7pm and as the time reached 7:40pm our boat guide became nervous. It seems that they usually head out around 7:30 and he was now nervous & uncertain about the owl and night-heron. We dipped both of them during a very hectic 40 min trip, although we had a **large-spotted Genet** instead. Very disappointed we went to bed that night...

Nov 12 – Okavango night specials, yes!!

Started with a Okavango boat trip at 7am. First up to a smaller **Southern Carmine Bee-eaters** and then in and out of channels and lagoons in search of **Pygmy goose**, that we found 2 pairs of and Rufous-bellied Heron that we didn't find. More birds that we did find were **White-faced Whistling-Ducks, Blue-cheeked Bee-eater, Gray-rumped Swallow, Chirping Cisticola** and **Redshouldered Widowbird**.

Very good sighting of the **fish-eagle** and in 10 knots a **Lesser Jacana** that after stopping could be viewed very good. Also **Yellow-billed Oxpecker**. Back at the lodge there where **Meyer's Parrot**, **Black Cuckoo**, **Cardinal Woodpecker**, **Collared Sunbird** and **Spottedbacked Weaver**. As the night came I had calls of a **Lesser Moorhen** for a short while before the night boat trip that this time was much better!! We started with a juvenile **White-backed Night-Heron** right at the sand brink of the camping. After a photo session we continued upstream and after just some 15 minutes encountered a **Pel's Fishing-Owl** and had splendid views for approx 1 minute at 2 different spots.

Very pleased we headed back for dinner with our new friend Mr. H, who is a **Hippo** who likes the flowers in the pond just 10 meters from the restaurant.

Nov 13 – Long drive day!

Started with a 2 hour walk on the fishing lodge premises. Very nice forest but not that many birds, the pair of **Black Cuckoos** from yesterday was around to day as well. After checking out and the border control to Namibia we stopped at the Miombo woodlands again, with **Tinkling Cisticolas** as main attraction.

After this birding we had a long drive down to Otavi where we spent the night.

Nov 14 – Parrot day!

After breakfast we headed towards Waterberg and at a stop along the road we encountered a **Yellow-bellied Eremomela**. In the camping site in Waterberg we soon found a sleeping **Rueppell's Parrot**, before climbing the top for a sunset view over the mountain where over 100 **Alpine Swifts** came in to roost. On the way up we had 2 **Bearded Woodpeckers**. In the car spotlight on the way down to dinner we had a **Spotted Eagle-Owl** that after dinner was found in our own backyard.

The game drive car was reported broke so all game drives are cancelled for the time being. Sounds very funny that they only have 1-2 vehicles for this ?!

Nov 15

Started with a 3km+ walk on the *Kambazembi Walk*. Fairly badly signed so we walked into a dead end at one point. Nice views of Hornbills, Warblers, Robins and Woodpeckers but nothing new for the trip. Did almost the same round in the afternoon and had our first nice views of Rose-faced Lovebirds and another **Rueppell's Parrot**. 2 **Monteiro's Hornbills** started some kind of display scene, sounding like a accelerating steam engine, finishing with the bird bouncing up and down on the branch. Looked very funny!

We where almost going to put this day to history as the first tick-free day until 2 **Freckled Nightjars** started to call. Puh! that was close...

Nov 16

Left Waterberg at sunrise and birded along the gravel road out to main Windhoek road until 9am with 2 **Verreaux's Eagles + Kori Bustard** and **Secretary-bird** in the same tube field. Headed into Windhoek and found a hotel close to the road going out to Avis dam where we settled in before heading out to Avis. It was not easy to find but after some wrong turnes we found the water with almost 100 **Egyptian Geese** and a single **Maccoa Duck** among other common waterfowls. After 3 weeks in Namibia it's hard to find anything exiting on a place like Avis but if you start at this place it will be more fun!

We walked around to locate any good place for Orange River Francolin for the next morning and had 2 **Lanner Falcons** flying by at close range.

Nov 17 – last tick day!

With the big question – should we have a new species every day on the trip. We should leave the car around 10 so we where at Avis Dam at sunrise and walked up the slope on the east side of the dam, playing the sound of **Orange River Francolin** from time to time. On the down slope 1 answered and later another but they didn't call by them self. We had to play the tape for every call from them. Very sculky and hard to see.

From the top of the hill we also had our last trip specie, an **Osprey**.

So, pleased with the stay in southern Africa we returned the car to Jumbo Car Hire and were transported out to Eros, down to Cape Town (where we had 3 **Cape Gannets** from the airplane) and home to Sweden via Heathrow.

Marsh Owl 1 hunting at Halali waterhole 3-4/11.

White-faced Owl heard at Halali camp 4/11 and seen at roost 5/11.

Pearl-spotted Owlet the most common and most day active owl seen at night at Daan Viljoen 29/10, and on day 2 in Erongo mountains 2/11, 1 Halali camp 5/11, 1 Ruacana area 6-7/11 and 1 Waterberg 15/11.

African Scops -Owl 1 seen at roost Halali camp and 2 heard at night 4/11, seen at roost again 5/11, heard at Ruacana camp 6/11.

Freckled Nightjar 2 heard Waterberg 15/11.

Rufous-cheeked Nightjar the most common Nightjar at night game reserve waterholes with up to 15 in Etosha 2-4/11. Also heard in Ruacana 6/11.

Alpine Swift 3-4 Karoopoort 26/10, 2-3 around Omaruru 1-2/11 and over 100 from top of Waterberg plateau 14/11.

Bradfield's Swift The first Namibian twitch for me in Windhoek 29/10 (Göran was shopping...), 2-3 Erongo mountains 2/11, 5 Waterberg 14/11 and 3-4 Avis dam 17/11.

Common Swift some in western Etosha 2-3/11 and over 500 Rundu SW 9/11. Over 200 en route to Otavi 13/11.

African Black Swift very few seen in Karoopoort area 26/10.

Little Swift 30 Karoopoort area 26/10, 2-3 Ruacana 7/11 and up to 50 in Windhoek/Avis 16-17/11.

White-rumped Swift some seen in Cape province 26-27/10 and in Daan Viljoen 30/10. Over 100 en route to Rundu 8/11.

African Palm-Swift the most common swift in Namibia, especially close to settlements, seen almost daily.

Red-faced Mousebird 2 Karoopoort 26/10, 20 Spitzkoppe1/11, 1 Popa Falls 9/11, 6-7 Shakawe 12/11

Speckled Mousebird 3 each day in cape province 26-27/10, 2 on 28/10 after pelagic trip.

White-backed Mousebird 15 Karoopoort area 26/10, 2 Spitzkoppe 1/11.

Giant Kingfisher 1 Popa Falls 9-10/11, up to 5 daily Shakawe 11-13/11.

Pied Kingfisher seen daily from Rundu SW to Shakawe 8-13/11, up to 30 on boat trip.

Malachite Kingfisher seen daily in Shakawe 11-13/11, up to 6-7 per day.

Woodland Kingfisher 1 Rundu SW 8/11, 1-4 daily in Ngepi and Shakawe 10-13/11.

European Bee-eater seen in numbers over 10 in Karoopoort 26/10, Etosha 2/11 and 4-5/11,Ngepi 10/11 and Waterberg 14-15/11.

Blue-cheeked Bee-eater only 1 on Okavango boat trip 12/11.

Olive (Madagascar) Bee-eater 3-4 around Ruacana 7/11.

White-fronted Bee-eater common around Shakawe lodge with approx. 10 daily 11-13/11.

Southern Carmine Bee-eater apart from the small colony on Okavango boat trip with 50 birds on 12/11 we also had them around Shakawe and Mahango on 10-13/11.

Swallow-tailed Bee-eater 4-5 29/10 and 2 30/10 Daan Viljoen. Daily in Ruacana, Mahango and Waterberg areas.

Little Bee-eater 4-5 Rundu SW 8/11, approx 5 daily in Mahango-Shakawe area 10-13/11.

Lilac-breasted Roller some en route Swakopmund 30/10, 2-3 Rundu SW 8/11, 10 Mahango 10/11 and some on road towards Windhoek.

Many roadside Rollers was either this or Purple Roller.

Purple Roller 1 en route Swakopmund 30/10, daily in Etosha 2-5/11, some in Waterberg 14-16/11.

Broad-billed Roller a single bird seen from Ngepi tent place 9/11.

Bradfield's Hornbill a single bird seen from Ngepi 10/11.

Monteiro's Hornbill 1 Spitzkoppe and 3 Omaruru C28 1/11, 2 Erongo mountains 2/11, 5-6 Ruacana 7/11, 3-8 dayly in Waterberg and Avis dam 15-17/11.

African Gray Hornbill a pair in Daan Viljoen 30/10, daily in Etosha with 3-4 3-5/11, also dayly in Shakawe and Waterberg.

Southern Yellow-billed Hornbill seen at Spitzkoppe and Omaruru in small numbers, most common as roadside bird towards Ruacana, 1 in each Waterberg and Avis dam.

Ground Woodpecker 1 close to Ceres in Cape province 26/10.

Olive Woodpecker 3-4 calling and 1-2 seen in Grootvanderbosch 27/10.

Cardinal Woodpecker 1-2 Shakawe 12/11.

Golden-tailed Woodpecker 2-3 Halali 4-5/11 and 1-3 Waterberg 15-16/11.

Bearded Woodpecker 2 Waterberg 14/11.

Knysna Woodpecker 3-4 heard in Grootvanderbosch 27/10.

Clapper Lark 1-2 both Cape province days 26-27/10, 2-3 Etosha 6/11.

Dune Lark 3 Rooibank 31/10.

Sabota Lark 2 Daan Viljoen 30/10, common to some every day Etosha 1-6/11, 2-3 Avis dam 17/11.

Fawn-colored Lark 1 Etosha 3/11, 3-4 Mahango drive 10/11, 3-4 Waterberg 16/11.

Southern Thickbilled Lark 30 Karoopoort 26/10 and heard 27/10.

Rufous-naped Lark 5-6 Mahango drive 10/11 and 1 Avis dam 16/11.

Red-capped Lark 30 Karoopoort 26/10, some 27/10, 20 towards Rooibank 31/10, 20-40 in Etosha on 2-3/11 and 5/11.

Chestnut-backed Finchlark several in western Etosha 2/11, 4-5 Etosha 5/11.

African Golden Oriole 1 pair in Ngepi and 1 in Mahango 11/11.

Eurasian Golden Oriole 2 Halali camp 5/11.

White-necked Ravenseen in small numbers on the 3 land birding days around Cape Town.

Pied Crow seen in Cape province and Etosha in small numbers, occasionally along road in Namibia.

Black Crow some in Cape Town 25/10, common in Etosha with numbers up to 10 2-4/11.

House Crow approx. 15 in Cape province 27/10.

Ashy Tit 1 each in Daan Viljoen 30/10, Rooibank 31/10 and Spitzkoppe 1/11.

Rufous-bellied Tit 1 Miombo woodlands 11/11.

Southern Black-Tit 4 9/11 and 3 11/11 Miombo woodlands.

Carp's Tit 2 Okaukuejo 2/11, 2 pair Halali 4/11 and 1 Halali 5/11, 4-5 Ruacana 7/11 and 3 Waterberg 15/11.

Central Hotel/Simon's Town – very nice B&B, very close to the pelagic boat. They do breakfast packs for early birders. http://bbnet.co.za/central_hotel/welcome.htm

Daan Viljoen reserve – tented on grass. Nice and good food at the restaurant. Cold night. **Langstrand resort** – well situated at the road between Swakopmund and Walvis Bay for a moderate price. Good restaurant but **cold** showers in our 2 bed bungalow. Own locked garage for the car. E-mail: bfernandez@walvisbaycc.org.na or gkruger@walvisbaycc.org.na

Hotel Staebe/Omaruru – pleasant German run hotel just outside town, marked in Lonely Planet. Good rooms, pleasant dinner and breakfast. Locked car park and we borrowed key for the 5am Francolin trip. Owners are said to know abouth the Hartlaub's Francolins.

Okaukuejo camp/Etosha – good camping facilities but on gravel and quite dusty. Buffet dinner is a good idea on a crowded place like this.

Halali camp/Etosha – the camping site looked like the Okaukuejo . Much less people here so we had a N\$300/night bungalow for 2 nights. Buffet dinner here as well.

Namutoni camp/Etosha – the best looked after site, with grassy camping. Buffet dinner here as well.

Omunjandi camp/west Ruacana – much better camp than the infamous Hippo pools camping. Sand/grassy campsite on the Cunene river and close to the Palm forest. N\$40/night with hot showers and WC. Tel: 067-22 18 15 (W) and 067-22 21 10. Expect to be alone on the camp!

Hotel Club Med/Grootfontein. Hotel with breakfast included and good restaurant & pub. **Ngandu safari lodge/Rundu**. Bungalow for N\$320 with breakfast. Made breakfast package for us.

Ngepi lodge/Okavango river this backpacker place close to Popa Falls is a smashing place. Good birding and very pleasant people that does dinners on request. Grassy camping. 2 nights camping + 2 dinners and multipliable beers N\$400 for both of us.

Shakawe fishing lodge/Botswana is the place for the Botswana specialties, especially the night active birds. The guide is very experienced. If you camp you can't use the restaurant, that's why we stayed in bungalow. E-mail: t.wild@info.bw

Otavi Gardens Hotel/Otavi hotel for N\$200, including breakfast. <u>Very</u> large steak for dinner

Waterberg plateau park 3 bed bungalow for N\$310 with self-catering facilities. Good restaurant.


From Swakopmund head out on C34 towards Hentiesbay. 4-5 km north of Swakop, after passing the salt works you will see a satellite tracking station on the right with large parabolas and a smaller gravel road going parallel to the C34. There is also a power line going parallel to the roads. At the turn off to the tracking station turn right in on that road and immediately left on to the smaller parallel road that then slightly turns away from the C34. Drive 2.6 km on this road and we had 4 larks on the right hand side some 100 meters out on the graval.

Hartlaub's Francolin

From Omaruru drive out on C33 towards Karibib. Just outside town turn right onto the C2315 that heads into the Erongo mountains. After 8.0 km you will pass a dry riverbed that some use to walk towards the rock outcrops. We drove 300 meters more and climbed the cattle fence and the cliffs. At this point you are quite close to the main (dry) riverbed. If you have checked the area in daylight you will, after climbing the cliff, find a plateau going in towards the cliff area. You can walk this plateau approx. 300 meters. From this view we heard and saw 3 groups of approx. 10-15 birds. Bring a scope if possible.

Herero Chat

From the main office drive to a t-junction and turn left towards Spitzkoppe. After a few 100 meters there is a smaller track on the right. Approx. 100 meters before the left turn off to first pick-nick site look for a gorge going into the left between to outcrops. We parked at the pick-nick site and walked around that outcrop and had 2 Chat's in this gorge.



Halali owls

If you pack yourself with binoculars and even better a big camera lens you will (hopefully) after a walk in the Halali camp be approached by some of the friendly garden workers. They seems to have very good knowledge of there owls. Just outside bungalow #19 (where we stayed) is a large tree where we had a **White-faced Owl** and outside #34 a **African Scops Owl** in the first tree in the wall dividing the park from the bungalows. On the 2nd day I went back to this tree to see if the Scops still was there, didn't find it at the exact same branch so walked around the tree and immediately one of the workers run towards me and pointed out the bird, this time 2-3 meters higher up.

Rufous-tailed Palm-Thrush: we walked in the palm forest west of the dry riverbed both at evening and the morning after without any result. My help when planning the trip who was here in August 01 had them around the huts east of the riverbed and when we birded there we also had 3. Drive down the gravel road, passing the huts and when the fence surrounding the huts park the car where the fence heads down towards the river. We found the birds in one of the big palms along the river. Should be best as early as possible.



Cinderella Waxbill is closer to the power station and Ruacana Falls. As you descend on the tarmac road from Ruacana and see the power station on the right, look to your left ahead and you will see a dry waterfall on the left slope. That's where you should be heading. When you pass on the bridge over the dry riverbed, park the car on a small dirt road going to the left down into the riverbed. Take the right riverbed and walk that upstream until you are in the area just under the waterfall. We first found them just up close to the fall but when we returned to the car we had them some 100-150 meters down as well, in trees looking like oaks. The walk down took approx. 30 minutes in very calm birding pace. It gets very warm in these riverbeds. Should be done as early as possible.

Popa Falls

From the reception the road divides into left and right. Take the right to come below the falls where we had a group of **Brown Firefinches**. If you stay at the sand beach here for more than 10 seconds you will have children offering boat trips to the island for **Rock Pratincole**. Cost N\$20. We refused this offer, if you join them note that you enter a breeding colony of very few birds.

The left road goes down into the huts area and after the huts you will find a bridge system going out towards the falls made of 5 iron bridges (for walking). There are many good tracks here and you will find a track that leads to a viewpoint looking over the upper falls where we both evenings saw 3-4 Pratincoles. Use scope.

Quail finch

3 km from the entrance & cattle fence to Ngepi there are large fields on your right when driving from Ngepi. Saw groups being flushed by farmer the first night and the next even sitting birds around 6pm.

Equipment

This is the main equipment we used and that might help you to plan the trip.

- * Madza 323 w/ 2 spare tires, water- and petrol-can. Good size for 2 birders.
- * Spotting scope; 1 Swarowski AT-80 and 1 20x. The 20x was a smaller scope, not in class with a modern scope but was useful in Etosha where you're not allowed to get out of the car.
- * Cameras; multiple lenses for Canon EOS series and Hi8 video camera.
- \ast Torches, small for night use at tents tried headlamp for first time, useful. 1 big Maglight for owls etc.
- * Tent for 3 people.
- * Waterproof clothes, especially for pelagic but also in Namibia.
- * Lars used 1day contact lenses, for those with glasses/lenses that haven't tried this on a trip, do it!
- * Tape recorder, useful both to get owls/francolins etc. To respond and to recognize sounds.
