Koko Nor (Qinghai Hu), Qinghai, China

18-20 July 2008

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General

With one day notice I had a weekend to spend and quickly decided to go to Koko Nor in Qinghai on the northeastern part of the Tibetan Plateau. As I had been to the area before, it required no advance planning and would guarantee good birding in a fantastic landscape. I did not really have any target bird in mind, although I was keen to see an adult male Ala Shan Redstart (which I did not). I spend 1.5 days in different habitats ranging from the grassy and scrubby hillsides at Rubber Mountains, the desert near Caka and at the meadows and wetlands along Koko Nor.

Highlights

Favorite birds included Henderson's Ground-Jay, Przewalski's Rosefinch (aka Pink-tailed Bunting), Great Black-headed Gull, Blanford's, Pere David's, Rufous-necked and White-rumped Snowfinches, Whitebrowed Tit and Black-necked Crane. The icing of the cake and the only lifer was however the cute Pallas's Cat that I stumbled upon when it was hunting Pikas.

Itinerary

18/7

I took the evening flight from Beijing to Xining and arrived around 21.00. The pre-booked driver met at the airport and we quickly drove the 27 km/<30 min to Xining town. I stayed at Qingken Holiday Hotel, which was perfectly ok.

<u>19/7</u>

We set of from the hotel at 04.00 and by 05.15 we passed the southeast corner of Koko Nor. As it was still dark I quickly decided to continue to Rubber Mountain shortly beyond Heimahe, at the southwest corner of the lake. Dawn was at 6.00 and just before we arrived at Heimahe, we briefly stopped to admire a large flock of Great Black-headed Gulls. By 06.30 we had reached one of the valleys I wanted to explore and I started to walk along the grassy and scrubby slopes. There were lots of interesting birds and flowering plants and an absolutely stunning view of the mountains and Koko Nor. I spent until 12.30 in this area and covered two major valleys on the northwest side of the road.



Back at the waiting car, we continued up over the pass (3817 masl) and down on the dry Caka side, where we had a noodle lunch in a small village. In the early afternoon, I looked for birds in one of the small patches of planted trees without finding anything in particular. Later in the afternoon I walked the desert further west towards Caka in search of Henderson's Ground-Jay and Blanford's Snowfinch. I also spent some time looking for Pallas's Sandgrouse, although I decided to leave the area at 17.00 before they normally start flying about. Instead I went back to Rubber Mountain and covered a third valley southeast of the road. Much the same birds as in the morning, but to my surprise I stumbled upon a Pallas's Cat at very close range. At sunset I wandered back to the road and we drove to Heimahe, where we found a decent hotel opposite to the major gas station.

This day I woke up at the crack of dawn 06.00 and walked to the shore-line of Koko Nor, which is probably about 2 km away from the village. The grassy meadows held lots of larks and the shore-line was full of waterbirds. I spent a great deal of time photographing the Great Black-headed Gulls, thinking that it must be just a matter of time until one turns up in my home country Sweden. [Sure enough, just a few hours later the first for Sweden was actually seen!]. At around 09.00 I was back by the road and the driver picked me up and drove east along the lake to the southeastern corner. Here is a marshy area that I birded for an hour or so, until it was time to return to Xining for the flight back to Beijing.

Weather

Saturday was warm, clear and sunny, but Sunday became overcast with a significantly lower temperature (still a shirt was enough). As I forgot to bring sun blocker, my nose and hands quickly turned cerise-coloured.

Logistics

I flew to Xining and had a pre-arranged regular car to pick me up and take me to all the birding areas. The driver Mr Wang (+8613897230568) did a terrific driving job. Everything worked out very smoothly and travel in the area is pretty straight-forward.

Site descriptions

I visited essentially four different areas. First it was the Rubber Mountains just southwest of Heimahe. This is part of the Qinghai Nanshan mountain range along the south end of Koko Nor. The mountain and hills are not very steep and covered with grazed grassland and scrubby hill-sides. Next I birded the desert area north of Lake Caka, which is a flat dry area next to a salt lake. The second day I spent along the shore of Koko Nor, firstly just outside Heimahe and secondly in a marshy area at the southeastern end of Koko Nor.

The desert near Caka on the south side of the mountain range is clearly much drier and habitat for Henderson's Ground-Jay, Blanford's Snowfinch and Pallas's Sandgrouse

One adult at the first visited valley in Rubber Mountain looked strange with pale under-wing coverts and was overall very pale, but had the brown back and narrow moustaches typical of the species.

One plus two seen and a few heard at the first visited valley in Rubber Mountain.

One pair at the wetlands outside Heimahe and one pair at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor.

100+ at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor.

Two at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor.

Little Ringed Plover, Charadrius dubius curonicus

Two at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor.

Kentish Plover, Charadrius alexandrinus alexandrinus

Ten near the wetlands outside Heimahe.

Lesser Sand-Plover, Charadrius mongolus atrifrons

One at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor.

Black-tailed Godwit, Limosa limosa ssp

800-1000 at the wetlands outside Heimahe and a few at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor. Presumably these were the western taxon.

Spotted Redshank, Tringa erythropus

Two at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor.

50+ at the wetlands outside Heimahe and 20 at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor Green Sandpiper, Tringa ochropus

One at the wetlands outside Heimahe and one at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor. Wood Sandpiper, Tringa glareola

Ten at the wetlands outside Heimahe and three at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor. Common Sandpiper, Actitis hypoleucos

One at the wetlands outside Heimahe and one at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor. Great Black-headed Gull, Larus ichthyaetus

100 in one flock just east of Heimahe and a few more flying over the lake just at sunrise the first morning. The second morning there was probably more than 1000 birds along the coast at the wetlands outside Heimahe. Only one juvenile and less than ten 2yr and 3yr were seen.

One plus three east of Heimahe and one near Caka.

Many near Caka and 20 at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor.

10-15 at the wetlands outside Heimahe, mostly closer to the water than the village.

Frequently seen at the first visited valley in Rubber Mountain and the second visited valley in Rubber Mountain and along the southern end of Koko Nor.

A few at the second visited valley in Rubber Mountain.

Two near Caka.

Two juveniles near the wetlands outside Heimahe and several juveniles and adults at the wetlands at the southeast corner of Koko Nor.

One at the first visited valley in Rubber Mountain and one at the second visited valley in Rubber Mountain.

10-15 at the first visited valley in Rubber Mountain and one at the second visited valley in Rubber Mountain.

Mammals

In addition to various Pikas, the following mammals were encountered. Himalayan Marmot, Marmota himalayana
