Costa Rica 28/1-17/2 2012

Introduction

This small and very friendly Central American country is a well visited birding and nature destination. That's why there is no need for a longer presentation of Costa Rica.

There are loads of trip reports out on the internet to give the reader an idea of where and when to go. With todays navigating systems it's very easy to drive by oneself between the lodges/hotels without waisting time of reading a map or even choose the wrong way. The only thing to complain about is the rather poor signing of roads and directions. After arriving to the birding area/the lodge just hire a guide on spot to help you fill in the gaps of the wish list. There are good local birders in every main birding area.

This trip was done as a family vacation with my wife, and therefor not a 24-hour a day birding trip. Even though she very often joins me in a birding walk all has an end and a rainforest walk never last forever in my family company!

We decided to do not so much driving, instead we stayed several nights at the same place and had a real look around instead of rushing away. We both agreed afterwards that this was not so bad at all. Because of that we just visited a smaller area of Costa Rica, only had one longer drive when changing locations. We also both agreed that we will surely go back there in a couple of years and see another part of the country! Maybe this trip report can give someone in the same situation an idea of what to do and see.

So remember when reading the rest – this was not a hardcore 24-hours-a-day birding trip. This was a nice a relaxed family vacation even though we managed to record around 360 species at the end.

Logistics

Flight tickets were bought from Ticket agency in Sweden, to a cost of about 1300 USd each.

The car was rented with help from Pieter Westra, Aratinga Tours to a cost of USd 1720 for the three weeks, incl navigator, full insurance and an emergency cell phone with one hour free calls. The rental agency delivered and picked up the car at our hotel. This was very much appreciated. Everything worked out fine with these arrangements and we can really recommend Pieters services.

All hotels and lodges were booked from Sweden via email contact direct to the hotel or lodge from a driving route we had planned from the beginning. All contacts and bookings worked out excellent. This is not a must because there are places to stay everywhere so drive and decide on spot is not a problem, but maybe time consuming in the end.

Just one tip, do not use #contacts# from web pages, these seems to work less good. I received a couple of answers quite late with excuses of emails in the spam folder. Look for the contact info/email adress on the web page and use that from your own email instead. All lodges and hotels we emailed replied quickly and booking online was mostly just by an email reply to confirm, a few hotels attached fill-in-forms that we emailed back.

Driving around with the help of the navigator caused us no problems at all, except that the battery in the Garmin satnav broke down, but lucky for us that was on the way to Manuel Antonio, one of the easiest destinations to reach without GPS. As the car rental company had an office in Quepos, less than 10 km from Manuel Antonio, we went in to their office when passing by and they switched on spot.

Hotels and Lodges

Hotel Buena Vista, Alajuela (27-28/1 and 16-17/2)

Located just 20 minutes from the airport and a, by birders, often used hotel as an overnight option if arriving late as we did. Friendly atmosphere, good start up birding in their garden along the Coffee trail, which is just downstairs their garden. They have a free shuttle bus service to and from the airport.

Poas Volcano Lodge (28-30/1)

Only an hours drive away from Alajuela and close to both the Poas Volcano and La Paz Waterfall garden. The rooms are rather small and rustic but well-functioning, though it gets a little chilly at night. The staff was very friendly and service minded and the food was good.

Hotel Gavilan, Puerto Viejo (30/1-2/2)

This is a well-used lodge by birders. It's situated only a few minutes' drive from La Selva. They can easily arrange with boat trips on the Rio Sarapiqui, but failed to be clear about confirming a guided tour in La Selva for us. The management at place did however arrange a guided bird watching tour for us early one morning. The atmosphere here is relaxed and very friendly with good and varied food. Add to those; bird rich surroundings including some shorter, really good trails.

Hotel Montana, Monteverde (2-6/2)

This was actually our second choice up in Monteverde (the first – Belmar was full). It's a nice hotel with a very friendly staff. As this was not a hardcore birding tour we wanted an accomodation closer to town for

more dinner options. The rooms were spacious and clean with a nice view over the Pacific hillside. We did not try their restaurant but it seemed to be at the same price level as out on town. We think this was good value for the money.

<u>Cerro Lodge</u> (6-9/2)

This lodge was open up about four years ago. They are advertising as a birdwatcher lodge. Really friendly atmosphere there, good food and a very service minded staff. The villas have plenty of space for two (or even 3 people), are clean and with a charming outdoor toilet and shower.

The lodge is not more than 15-20 minutes from the boat trips on Tarcoles River or a rainforest walk in Carara N.P. They organized with both things in advance if one wish, on spot they seemed to arrange it for the next day in most cases.

The negative thing was that they don't take plastic money, just cash. I did tell them this was a minus for them.

Inn on the Park Hotel, Manuel Antonio (9-14/2)

This little hotel is just 100 meters before the new entrance to the national park. Which actually is the exit mentioned in the guide Where to Watch Birds Costa Rica, B. Lawson.

Spacious rooms, a friendly staff on their bonus, the less good was a rather poor garden with both a small pool and a tiny parking area. Nice views of the hillside but partly hidden behind some palms. There is other nearby options with probably much better possibilities for birding while the Mrs/Ms is still asleep.

Trogon Lodge, San Gerardo de Dota (14-16/2)

Wonderful placed on a hillside in the same valley as the more wellknown Savegre Mountain Lodge. After been visiting Savegre for a buffet style lunch and walked one of their trails it's our point of view that Trogon is the better lodge. That was the feeling we had when leaving.

Trogon Lodge also has an employed very good bird watcher named Isaac. We used him for a half day and he did not disappoint us.

A little minus for Trogon is that it's very steep to the upper cabins/houses. Their trails are maybe not as good as Savegres but we birded along the main road and that was very good.

Trogon Lodge is a part of Grupo Mawamba, which also runs other lodges in Costa Rica.

Visited sites and places

Poas Volcano Lodge (28-30/1)

This lodge was beautifully placed in an area of mixed farmland and patches of forest. The lodge was badly damaged by the earthquake 2009, but is now rebuilt and the main house is completely refreshed. They have 3 own trails of different length and walking grade. We tried the most of their stretches during one afternoon. They can for sure be very productive an early morning. The Quetzal trail is the longest and probably the best. Be aware that the marking is not the best but with common sense one makes it. The other trails were named Oakwood Trail (second longest) and meets the Quetzal. "Lodge" Trail is short but not unproductive at all, going around the main building through a small patch of forest and is, without birds, done in 5-10 minutes.

La Paz Waterfall Garden (29/1)

A tourist trap, but as it is close to the Poas Volcano Lodge, we gave it a try. It's more like a mini zoo with a hummingbird garden (feeders) big enough to get a Costa Rica beginner rather frustrated. They also have a waterfall trail which ends by a small souvenir shop and a shuttle bus service back to the entrance – for free. There are also some fruit tables for tanagers placed along the trail right behind the reception.

They also served buffet lunch, which was included in the entrance fee. For the new arrived birder this was not a bad option at all.

Entrance fee: USd 48, buffet lunch included as well as entrance to all facilities like the butterfly garden.

Cinchona Restaurant and lookout (29/1)

This tiny local restaurant is situated just a few km further along the road after passing La Paz, with a few feeders and fruit table. We stayed here for an hour and recorded a few species but not any of the barbets. Make a small donation so they can keep on feeding the birds.

Monteverde area (2-5/2)

This is a very well known site because of the cloud forest. We walked the trails for more than three hours and never get bored because of the forest itself, even though we did not see that much with birds.

There are a lot of other places to visit in the area as well, depending of interest. We visited Selvatura Park with a zip line, hanging bridges and a small hummingbird garden as well as butterfly garden, frogs and snakes. Also a touristy area but the hanging bridges trail is good and quite close to St Elena reserve, which makes the area bird rich. We headed for the first tour of the day and there were not so many people on the trails. They also provide lunch in their restaurant.

We joined a birding tour around hotel El Bosque with guide Adrian Mendez a couple of hours one morning and also a night walk in the same area with our guide Eduardo.

Entrance fees: Monteverde Cloudforrest USd18/pers. No guide included. The ticket is valid the whole day. That means you can go in for a morning walk, go back home and have breakfast, rest and come back in the afternoon on the very same ticket. Compare with Manuel Antonio later on.

<u>Selvatura: USd36/each</u> – lunch not included – but transportation both ways, with pick up from the hotel.

<u>Birding tour & night walk at El Bosque:</u> USd 40/each per tour. Transportation from and back to the hotel. The morning tour included also breakfast at Stella's bakery.

Cerro Lodge and surroundings (6-9/2)

The entrance road is very good for an afternoon or a morning walk. The lodge garden got Scarlet Macaws, flying by Muscovy Duck, some "hummer" species, Turqouise-browed Motmot and Stripe-headed Sparrow to name a few.

Carara N.P

No need for a long presentation, together with La Selva the most famous national park in Costa Rica. We hired a guide for a morning walk along River Trail and walked the trails around the head quarter by ourselves, with good result both times.

Entrance fee: USd 10/each.

A guided (see below) 2-hour trip is USd40/each, entrance fee included, we added another USd 10 each for a relaxing 3-hour walk.

Tarcoles River (boat trip)

We was guided by Lois Campos, he got many years on the river and no crocodile feeding.

Price including transportation from and to our lodge was USd 55/each.

Manuel Antonio N.P (10-14/2)

We were a little unlucky here because some of the trails were closed for reparation though to a heavy storm a month earlier. We were, for example, not allowed to walk the "Cathedral trail" to the lookout where one can have a look at the Brown Booby colony or have a chance of Spot-fronted Swift. Otherwise this park is not to be recommended. Heards of tourists led by over enthusiastic guides showing sloths and monkeys receiving applauds from the tourists were our impression. The park is not too bird rich (Diego Aráuz pers comment).

Entrance fee: USd10/each and the ticket is only valid one time, so having both a morning and an afternoon walk will double the cost.

Esquipulas

This is actually a tiny village some 40 minutes inland from Manuel Antonio. We were brought here by our guide Diego Aráuz.

We walked along a main (gravel) road with him and had a wonderful morning, full of birds. As this is a rather new area even for Diego he still finds new species on his visits. His list is now of about 110 species and with a fair chance of Spot-crowned Euphonia and King Vulture this guide and area is to recommend. Other species regulary seen is Blue-crowned Manakin, White-throated Shrike–Tanager and Fiery-billed Aracari, although we did not see them.

Guides

Monteverde: Adrian Mendéz (bird trip) and Eduardo (night walk).

Both are young men but very skillful with sharp eyes and well educated. Adrain had moved from the Carara area some years ago, where he had been working at Villa Lapas and their trails.

Around Stellas bakery is the place to find guides early in the morning, or ask for El Bosque birding trip at any of the tourist informations and they will surely phone him.

All our trips and tours around Monteverde were booked at the very first small tourist information some km before St Elena. A very nice, young lady named Ani Venezulana helped us with all bookings. She is advertising for free coffee which is very handy after the drive up the mountain on a rather rough dirt road. All the "pick ups" and trips we booked and paid for here worked out excellent.

Tarcoles River: Lois Campos, advertising with 17 years on the river and no crocodile show. That's very positive for a birder.

It's a nice man but maybe a little too much eager for the money and not negotiable about the time of the trip.

He is advertising "The only boat tour on the Tarcoles River created by Birders for Birders". Daily tours 6 am, 9 am and 3 pm.

He charged USd 40 each + 15 each for transportation from Cerro Lodge. <u>Cell phone English</u>: +506 2433-8278

Carara N.P: Victor Mora Chaves, speaks excellent English, know the birds in and around Carara N.P even though he seemed a little unsure of flycatcher calls, but who is not! Also a well educated nature guide.

Manuel Antonio: We came in touch with Diego Aráuz through one of the many tourist information offices in Manuel Antonio, one of four guides with focus upon birds in this area.

Diego charged USd 60 each for 4 hours, but at the end it turned out to be more like a half day. He also guides people inside Manuel Antonio national park but his opinion is that the park is poor with birds.

He speaks excellent English and is a guy who easily adapts to ones wishes and don't waste time on species already on the list. He is really enthusiastic and also worth to mention, a well educated wildlife guide.

He took us to a small village called Esquipulas and we had a wonderful day walking along the main road. This was a rather small dirt road with very few vehicles and very nice scenery. Diego is also a very good alternative when comes to find the rather tricky Mangrove Hummingbird. He has a stake out area for them!

We can highly recommend his services.

His father also runs mangrove boat trips, named Monkey Tours, at the small village of Damas. Coming from Quepos turn left at big sign for Puebla Real a few km before Damas. Drive to the very end of the road where there is a small jetty.

The Aráuz family lives on the left side along the very same road, after a km or so. There is a not too visible sign with contact infiormation. We did the mangrove tour the same afternoon and we can really recommend this. It was actually Diego who was guiding this tour as well. The price is USd 65 per person, maybe a little expensive at first thought but in the end it turned out to be absolutely the best mangrove tour I have ever made.

Trogon Lodge: Isaac Quiros Mora is employed by the lodge. Also one of those quiet but very skillful guides we met. Isaac was very quick to understand that we already had seen a lot of species so he asked what we had seen so far and focused on the missing ones that were present in his region.

We asked for a 4 hour birding trip, the lodge also offers a 2 hour Quetzal walk. We birded from early morning for a couple of hours had a break for breakfast and then we continued almost to lunch. We really enjoyed his company.

Ask for him at the reception or simply book a morning. The lodge charged USd 40/each and the fee was put on the room and payed for when we left.

Litterature

For bird identification we used Birds of Costa Rica, R. Garrigues, R. Dean. I left the old but still (text) useful A. Skutch bird guide at home, mainly because of size and weight.

For the locations we made most of the research from Where to Watch Birds Costa Rica, B. Lawson. Add to this excellent book also various trip reports found on the internet.

For mammals we locally bought a small leaflet about Costa Rica's most commonly seen animals.

Daily log

27/1. We had a morning flight from Stockholm/Arlanda to Newark airport, New York and then an afternoon connection to Santamaria airport, Alajuela. Hotel Buena Vista picked us up with their shuttle bus and we checked in an hour before midnight.

28/1. We birded the hotel grounds in the morning before breakfast. Our rental car arrived to the hotel in time and by 11 am we were safely directed by our Garmin navigator towards Poas Volcan Lodge. Checked in and birded their trails in the afternoon.

29/1. After breakfast we drove to and visited La Paz Waterfall Garden and restaurant/mirador Cinchona.

30/1. Left the Poas Volcan Lodge after breakfast and headed towards the Poas volcano. The weather was fine until we arrived to the volcano so any crater or lake was not to be seen. After that we drove towards Puerto Vieja and Gavilan Lodge a little earlier than expected. Arrived just after lunch so we checked in and drove to Puerto Vieja for lunch. Birded the lodge grounds in the afternoon.

31/1. Birded La Selva entrance road after breakfast and later also El Tigre marsh. After a lunch at Gavilan Lodge we had a magnificent boat trip (2-5 pm) with skipper Adolphus along the river Sarapiqui. Shallow water he said, so no Sungrebe showed up.

1/2. Started with an early morning in La Selva, guided by excellent guide Christian. Back to the lodge for breakfast and later we drove to Heliconias Island Lodge and walked around their garden and had a lazy time until lunch. The afternoon was spent around Hotel Gavilan.

2/2. Checked out and left Gavilan for Monteverde just after breakfast. This was thought to be a very time consuming drive but we arrived at Hotel Montaña around 3 pm. Stopped en route (Caldera) for lunch. Had a break at the first info center/ticket both before arriving to Santa Elena. The girl at the center, Ani Venezulana, was very helpful and suddenly we had agreed to some activities during our stay.

3/2. Morning visit to the Selvatura Park where we walked the hanging bridges trail. We also visited their tiny hummingbird garden and had lunch. In the afternoon we visited Don Juan Coffee Plantation just a short way from Selvatura, so we had to go the same rough way twice the very same day.

4/2. We started early with a pre booked morning birding with a guide around Hotel El Bosque. This was a part of the dry wood on the Pacific slope. Rather windy morning so the result was not as good as expected. After breakfast we headed for the cloud forest and spend almost 5 hours there, without any guide.

5/2. Today we decided to tick off the quetzal and drove to the cloud forest entrance at first light. Had breakfast at Stella's bakery and then we birded around Hotel Montaña for a while. After lunch we drove back and birded around the hummingbird feeders. Nice and relaxing. Early

dinner and ended the day with a two hour night walk around Hotel El Bosque.

6/2. Had a lazy morning, and after breakfast we packed the car and drove to Cerro Lodge. The GPS stopped working 3 km before the lodge! Rested until late afternoon, then we birded the entrance road at Cerro Lodge with very good result.

7/2. Early breakfast and picked up 06.45 by Lois Campos for a boat trip on the Tarcoles River. After 2 hours he drove us back to the lodge. Had lunch and after that we went to Carara N.P and walked the trails around the head quarter by ourselves for a couple of hours with much more birds seen than expected.

Late afternoon we walked the entrance road.

8/2. Once again an early breakfast and off to Carara N.P for a guided morning walk along the River trail with Victor Mora. The 3-hour walk was very productive and we really enjoyed his company. He speaks excellent English and knows where to find the birds. After that we drove the gravel road past Villa Lapas all the way up to the small village of Bijugal and had lunch. Late afternoon we drove to the village of Tarcoles and walked along the dirtiest beach we ever seen. Not much of birds either, except a small lagoon with some waders and a lot of boobies, gulls & terns around some fishing boats, far out.

9/2. I went up early and birded around the lodge and the entrance road before we left Cerro Lodge for Manuel Antonio. Arrived there well before lunch and had to wait for our room. We took a long walk, had lunch and

went back to our hotel. In the afternoon we walked around in the surroundings and relaxed on the balcony.

10/2. I took a morning walk around our hotel before breakfast. Directly after the meal we went to the national park. The most commercial park we visited with loads of tourists screaming and applauding monkeys and sloths. We did not use any guide and walked around ourselves. Unfortounatelly some of the trails were closed for reparation after a heavy storm a month earlier. We left the park for lunch and as the ticket only was valuable one time we did not go back. Instead we had a lazy afternoon in the sun.

11.2. A very early start for a pick up of Diego Aráuz, our guide, at an agreed meeting point in Quepos at 6am. We then drove straight to an area near the tiny village of Esquipulas and birded until lunch. We gave Diego a ride back to his home near Quepos though he had a stake out for Mangrove Hummingbird. I got brief wievs of a female. We both agreed to go with Diego on a mangrove trip in the afternoon, arranged by his fathers company.

12.2. We had a well deserved lazy morning with late breakfast. Decided to take the car and go for some sightseeing. Drove towards Damas and took a dirt road following the Parrita River down to the sea. We went back to Manuel Antonio for lunch and after that we had another very relaxing afternoon.

13.2. After a rather late breakfast we drove to a spice plantation called Villa Vanilla and participated in a guided tour. This was really an educational trip with some new tasty experiences. In the afternoon we had a boat trip to a nearby beach for snorkeling (very poor) and some sunset views.

14.2. This, the last morning in Manuel Antonio, started with an early morning walk. I found a small trail leading in to a well forested area. We left the touristy Manuel Antonio for the much calmer high altitudes around San Gerardo de Dota after breakfast. We had booked a couple of nights at Trogon Lodge close to the well known Savegre. We arrived safely to the lodge in the early afternoon after a lunch stop at Restaurant Georgina. After the check in and had carried our luggage to the top cabin we had an afternoon walk on one of their trails.

15.2. Since we had pre booked a half day with the local bird guide, named Isaac it was an early wake up. Started with a cup of coffee in the restaurant and then we walked to the small Savegre stream and started to bird. Back for breakfast and then we drove down through the valley, made some stops along the road. We birded the rest of the morning around the trout farm. After having said goodbye to Isaac we drove down to the Savegre Lodge, had lunch and then we walked the Los Quebrados trail.

16.2 I went up at 06.00 birded along the main road until breakfast. Then packing and check out and started to drive our back towards San José. First we went up to Cerro de la Muerte and birded for an hour. Not much was seen. Arrived safely to Hotel Buena Vista in the afternoon, our car was to be picked up at 17.00 by the rental company. Birded the Coffee Trail in the late afternoon.

17.2 Morning birding around the hotel. At 10.30 we were taken to the airport by the shuttle bus service and started our journey back to

Sweden. Arrived to Stockholm via Newark and Heathrow/London after an overnight flight in the late afternoon 18.2.

Little Tinamou *(Crypturellus soui)* 1 heard Hotel Gavilan 1/2 and 1 heard near Cerro Lodge 6/2.

Muscovy Duck *(Cairina moschata)* 2 seen flying by daily Cerro Lodge 6-9/2 and 2 Tarcoles River 7/2.

Gray-headed Chachalaca (Ortalis cinereiceps)

1 Hotel Gavilan 31/1, 7 passing through the garden Hotel Gavilan 2/2 and 2 El Bosque trail, Monteverde 4/2.

Crested Guan (Penelope purpurascens)

1 La Selva 1/2 and 2 River trail, Carara N.P. 8/2.

Black Guan (Chamaepetes unicolor)

1 Poas Volcano Lodge 29/1, 1 El Bosque trail, Monteverde 4/2, 2 Monteverde 1/2, 2 Monteverde cloudforrest 4/2 and 1 Sendero los Quebrada trail, Savegre Lodge 15/2.

Wood Stork (Mycteria americana)

1 seen soaring over La Selva entrance road 1/2, 13 passing over Cerro Lodge 6/2, 5 Tarcoles River 7/2, 1 Damas 11/2 and 1 Parrita River 12/2.

Magnificent Frigatebird (Fregata magnificens)

Common along the Pacific coast.

Brown Booby (Sula leucogaster)

20 seen from the Tarcoles public beach 8/2 and up to 70 seen around the breeding cliff Manuel Antonio 9-13/2.

Neotropic Cormorant (*Phalacrocorax brasilianus*)

2 seen on the boat trip Rio Sarapiqui 31/1.

Anhinga (Anhinga anhinga)

1 Rio Sarapiqui 31/1, 10 seen on the boat trip Tarcoles River 7/2 and 2 seen in a roadside pond between Quepos-Parrita 12/2.

Brown Pelican (Pelecanus occidentalis)

Fairly common along the Pacific coast.

Bare-throated Tiger-Heron (*Tigrisoma mexicanum*)

1 seen Hotel Gavilan 31/1-2/2, 2 on the boat trip Tarcoles River 7/2 and 1 on the mangrove tour Damas 11/2.

1 Rio Sarapiqui 31/1, 1 Heliconias Island 1/2, 5 seen on the boat trip Tarcoles River 7/2, 1 River trail, Carara N.P. 8/2, 2 seen on the mangrove tour Damas 11/2 and 1 Manuel Antonio 13/2.

Great Egret (Ardea alba)

Fairly common in wet grassland and along rivers.

Snowy Egret (Egretta thula)

1 roadside, near Caldera 2/2, 20 seen on the boat trip Tarcoles River 7/2, 10 seen on the mangrove tour Damas 11/2 and 10 along Parrita River 12/2.

Little Blue Heron (Egretta caerulea

1 Rio Sarapiqui 31/1, 15 seen on the boat trip Tarcoles River 7/2, 1 Manuel Antonio 10/2, 5 seen on the mangrove tour Damas 11/2 and 5 along Parrita River 12/2.

Tricolored Heron (Egretta tricolor)

Black-faced Grosbeak *(Caryothraustes poliogaster)* 2 Hotel Gavilan 31/1-1/2, 2 La Selva entrance road 31/1 and 2 La Selva 1/2.

Black-thighed Grosbeak (*Pheucticus tibialis*) 2 Trogon Lodge 15/2 and 1 there 16/2.

Rose-breasted Grosbeak (*Pheucticus ludovicianus*) 1 male Hotel Buena Vista 16/2.

Indigo Bunting (*Passerina cyanea*) 1 younger male Esquipulas 11/2.

Red-winged Blackbird (Agelaius phoeniceus) 150 El Tigre Marsh 31/1 and 15 seen on the boat trip on Tarcoles River 7/2.

Lesser Long-nosed Bat *(Leptonycteris yerbabuenae)* 11 day roosting on a tree trunk along the Sarapiqui River 31/1.

White-nosed Coati (Nasua narica) 2 males Selvatura Park 3/2, 1 El Bosque Trail 5/2 and 3 near Bijugal 8/2.

Crab-eating Raccoon (*Procyon cancrivorus*) Around 10 seen Manuel Antonio N.P. 10/2.

Common (Northern) Raccoon (*Procyon lotor*) 10 El Bosque Trail 5/2.

Variegated Squirrel (Sciurus variegatoides)

Common and the most frequent seen mammal. Seen at Hotel Buena Vista, Poas Volcano Lodge, La Paz, Heliconias Island, Selvatura Park, El Bosque Trail to mention some places.

Alfaro's Pygmy Squirrel (Microsciurus alfari)

1 Monteverde Cloudforrest 4/2 and 1 Esquipulas.

Collared Peccary *(Pecari angulatus)* Around 15 seen La Selva 1/2.
